TRACKMEN MEET MAINE IN SPRING CINDER CLASH

University's Strength Unknown—Should Be Strong in Distance Events

SANBORN AND HENDRIE COUNTED ON FOR FIRSTS

Team Well Balanced, Dexter Strong in Hammer, Shot and Hurdles

The track team steps out on its first trip of the season Friday morning when they leave for the opening dual meet of this year which will be held with the University of Maine at Orono on Saturday. Twenty-two men will make the trip, besides Coach Kanaly, Trainer Johnson and Manager Northrup.

The dual meet with Maine is a new attraction on the varsity schedule and ought to provide a good test for the outfit that will represent the Institute this year. The interclass games last week brought out the fact that there is plenty of good material here and that the prospects for a winning combination are good. In spite of the fact that the records established last Friday were not allowed on account of the high wind helping the runners along, the performances were good enough to show that there are some mighty fast men on the squad.

Maine a Dark-Horse

Not much is known about the strength of the Maine college as far as a track team goes. However, Maine has had a mighty fine cross-country outfit during the last two years and is sure to have some good men in the distance events. The Engineers are far from weak in these events, however, and with Bob Hendrie and Elmer Sanborn to carry the Cardinal and Gray in the two long races, the Maine boys will have to show some stellar work to shine in these events.

The Engineers have a well balanced outfit this year and there is enough strength scattered throughout the team to insure a good showing in all the events. Captain Art Smith is running in fine form in the quarter, while Charlie Snow seems to be the Institute's best bet in the half. The dashes will be well taken care of by Heap and Porter, while Dexter, Blodgett and Ambach ought to come through in the hurdles. Dexter seems to be the all-round man on the team, as he is the class of the squad in the shot and hammer, besides being one of the best performers over the high timbers.

Ineligibles a Big Asset

In the field events, some of the ineligibles would come in handy this season. The top places in the interclass games in the pole vault were taken by ineligibles, while a good showing was made by them in other events. McArdle and Greenough will work for the Engineers in the high jump and if their performances are up to the mark, they ought to account for a place at least.

The team is anxious to start the season off with a win and every effort will be directed toward defeating the Orono runners. Many of the squad will be ex-harriers and to defeat the University will be especially gratifying to them after bowing to Maine two years running over the hill and dale route. However, a track meet is a different story and the balance on the Engineer team ought to prove a factor in their favor.

Upperclasses Battle Today in Fourth Contest of Class Series

Both Teams Won Opening Games—Juniors Are Strong With Bat

The Seniors and Juniors, who won their opening games meet this afternoon for a game that should be the best since the interclass season started. Both teams seem to have the goods and the game today ought to bring out some good playing on both sides. The teams did not have a chance to get in any real good practice this week owing to rain. The Juniors had a little batting practice on Monday but the bad weather spoiled it. The Seniors have not practiced since last Tuesday and this may have its effect.

The Senior lineup will be practically the same as in the frosh game with Bob Hull in the box and Abe Kenney on the receiving end of the battery. Frank Knight will start at first and Frank Hassler will cover second base. Capt. Ted Storb has a bad shoulder and will be unable to play at shortstop. Jack Sullivan is expected to play the position. Barker will be at third and Nelson Mann will start in left field. Adams will cover center and Sambo Gordon will be in right field. The Seniors did not hit so well in the game with the freshmen, but they have had a lot of batting practice since then and they should be strong with the stick by now.

Bates at Short

The Juniors have not had a game since the opener, two weeks ago and they have had some good practice sessions since then and have shown steady improvement. Either Walt Kennett or Fitzgerald will start on the mound for the '24 team tomorrow and Michelena or Joe Piland will occupy the catcher's berth. Bill Walter-skirchen will hold down the initial sack and Shorty Manning will play second. Earl Bates, the Junior's best man at bat, will play shortstop and either Stu Lankton or Ran Giles will cover third. The Juniors have plenty of material for the outfield and who will start in the various positions will not be known until the game starts. Parker and Robinson may get into the game in center and either Robertson or Daly will hold down right. Left field will be taken care of by either Chapin, Donkersley or Canfield.

Juniors Play Twice

The Juniors play two games this week and on Saturday they meet the '26 team. The frosh, although defeated in their opening games, nevertheless have a lot of good players on the field and they will put up a good battle on Saturday against the Juniors. The Sophomores have no game this week and they will have a chance to get in some good batting practice which is needed by all the teams. George A. Jenckes, a Senior now coaching the '25 team, and the addition of a coach to the Soph squad ought to make things look pretty bright for the season. The Sophs have a strong team and with practice will wage a strong battle for the cup.

Golf Team Meets Army for Season's Opener

The golf team is getting into shape for the first match of the season which takes place with the Army at West Point this Saturday. The members of the team will leave Friday going down to New York by boat. There is a possibility that a six man team may be taken but that has not been decided definitely yet. Captain Fritz Clement has been out on the links and can be depended upon to come through his match with his old-time form.

Courses Available

Ab Johnson, Conant, and Ballard have also been getting into trim, so the Engineers will present a strong array of golfers at West Point. Quite a number of new men have signed up, and are turning their scores in now or will do so as soon as possible. The certified scores are to be turned in to Miss Kelly in the A. A. office as soon as practicable. It is urged that this be done immediately as the men must be selected for the team.

A number of the Golf courses in the vicinity of Boston will be open to the golf squad. The candidates can now play every week day on the course of the Woodlawn Club, and the time for playing has been apportioned among the men. The Commonwealth course is also available, and arrangements have been made to obtain the Merrimack Valley Course every week day with the exception of Wednesday, free of charge.

TENNIS MEN PLAY HARVARD GRADS

Round Robin Not Yet Finished—Team Composed of Last Year's Players

The tennis squad opens the regular playing season this afternoon when they meet the team from the Harvard Graduates School on the Chestnut Hill courts. Although there has not been enough time before this first match to rank the members of the team by means of the round robin, the majority of the tennis men have been able to get in quite a little practice on indoor courts. The Harvard team is an especially strong combination as they have two of their veteran players back, in addition to some good new material.

Captain Tremaine will run a six man team and they will be selected from those who stood highest in the fall tournament and from the members of last year's team. Very likely some changes will be made after the matches in the round robin have been played off. The chances for a winning team this year look mighty good as a veteran combination can be used to build up a strong outfit.

Probable Team

The team is only selected temporarily now until all the matches between members of the squad have been played off. About nine men will be on the list for today's contest, and as it looks now the following men will go to Chestnut Hill: Captain Tremaine, Tressel, Russell, Harris, McWane, Gourley, Miller, Hayden, and Dunn. Six singles and six doubles will be played.

Captain Tremaine will be right on the job for the Engineers and can always be expected to give a good account of himself. Tressel played in the Amherst and Williams match last year and Gourley also has had experience on the court. Joe Russell was runner up in the fall tournament and will be right after a regular varsity berth. Harris and Miller both showed up well last season.

Strong Harvard Combination

The matches can certainly be expected to be fast and hotly contested as the Crimson outfit has two of their veteran players back. Herndon who made a record with the Princeton racqueters is again with the Graduates' team. He is a fast man on the court and will cause the Engineers to be right after him every minute. Bundy, the second veteran of last year's squad is probably Harvard's best bet. He was captain of the tennis team when at Yale. In the matches last season the Institute tennis men came away with a 4-2 victory, and they will be right on their toes to repeat the performance this year, but they can expect no easy matches.

Drawings Made

The candidates for the team have been divided into two groups and the men in each group will play each other. Group A consists of the men who stood highest in the tournament, while Group B includes the men just below the first group. The drawings have been made and the following men will play in Group A. Tressel vs Russell and McWane vs Harris. Eight men include Group B and they have been drawn as follows: Harding vs Storb, Miller vs Gordon, Hayden vs Dunn, and Evans vs Massey.

Tuition Higher Than Tech

The tuition fee at the Princeton University for the next academic year has been raised \$50. This increase is due to the increase in professors' salaries and the enlargement of the teaching staff. The salary budget has also been raised by \$50,000.

OARSMEN ARE TO MEET FAST NAVY CREWS SATURDAY

Varsity and First 150 Pounders Journey to Race Against Middle Eights

LEAVING TOMORROW FOR ANNAPOLIS WITH COACHES

Both Opponents Successful in Contests Last Week Against Penn

Tomorrow evening the Institute's varsity and 150 pound crews leave for Annapolis to meet the Navy oarsmen. The two contests will be held Saturday afternoon on the Severn and open the regular schedule, with Technology pitted against some of the strongest crews of the east.

The Varsity will have for their opponents the middle first boat which left the Penn varsity two lengths behind last Saturday. The course covered then was the Henley distance, the same that will be followed in the coming contest, and the time made by the winning boat was considered very good, against a rather stiff wind and with quite a chop on the river.

Bad Conditions Would Favor Navy
Though the Institute Varsity has had considerable practice under none too favorable conditions, their chances for success will not be as great if the rough water of last week prevails again. The heavier and more experienced Navy boat would then have the advantage. The dope seems to be that if the conditions are good, the Technology oarsmen should make a very credible showing.

The 150 pound varsity which is to make the trip is slated to meet the Annapolis plebe eight. Rowing last Saturday as the Navy third boat this outfit had little trouble in leaving the Penn third two lengths behind under the same bad weather conditions that prevailed during the race between the first eights. The time made was considerably slower than that of the Navy varsity.

150 Pounders in Better Form

The brush with Stone School last week does not seem to indicate that the 150 pounders have much of an eight, but the result has been to make every member of the outfit spruce up. The poor spacing that was so noticeable at high stroke in this boat has received much attention since then, so that the workouts the last few days have shown an improvement in this factor.

When the stroke is raised there is of course a tendency for the spacing to decrease, and it is with this that the Institute crews have had much of their trouble. Being lighter than most college eights, they are easily so affected.

The coaches of both eights are to accompany the men, and Pat Manning is to go along as rigger. As is usual several substitutes are on the list of those leaving. Don Murdock having been chosen from the second varsity and Arthur Keay from the second 150 pound lineup. Coach Dellenbaugh, the Varsity's coach, is to be accompanied by Mrs. Dellenbaugh. She is to be the mascot, according to him.

Funny thing, but most of the ineligibles on the squad seem to be in the star class. Although they are not able to compete this year they will be able to help out the team next year and their help will be appreciated with many of the stars of this year's team graduating.

The Maine trip will show what sort of a team can be taken to the dual meets to represent the Institute with a small number of men competing. Twenty-two men will be taken on the Maine trip, but this number includes all the best men on the squad and they will put up a fight that will make the Pine Tree Staters travel to heat.

Elmer Sanborn and Bob Hendrie Should Lead Team Scoring

At least one pair of Frank Kanaly's hopes in the Maine meet are being put under the spotlight of his attention until the big opener of the season has been met, and considering the reliance put on them by the rest of the track squad and by the school in general, it is small wonder that Frank has turned his binoculars on them.

Elmer Sanborn and Bob Hendrie, each of whom has had his day as undisputed leader on the long distances, are counted on to be the leaders again this year in the gathering of points for the Institute, and Frank has spent considerable time in getting them into the best of condition for the meets.

Held Down in Class Meet

The interclass track meet last Friday was not to be taken as any indication of the power of these two leaders, for both were under orders to hold in. Elmer had little trouble leading the field in the mile, but Frank Kanaly's orders were, "hold yourself in or you'll get yanked off," so Elmer held himself. It is safe to say, however, that there will be no "holding" in the Maine meet Saturday—it will be a battle to the finish.

Bob Hendrie, the Institute's dean of distance runners, has also been under orders to save himself this spring, but he certainly broke out yesterday afternoon when he ran a three-mile time trial. To a track man the words, "time trial" mean a grueling hard race, even over a short distance, but a three-mile timed event is almost unheard of thing. While Frank follows his old custom of keeping his times to himself, Bob's speed and his form at the end of the test were such that it takes no courage to predict a brilliant spring season for the veteran harrier.
