Dr. Stratton returned Friday from Washington, where he attended a meeting of the National Academy of Science. He had been in the Capitol for a week and had a conversation with the President.

He said that in his opinion Dr. G. K. Burgess '96, his successor in charge of the Bureau of Standards, is well qualified to carry on the work of the bureau. His work, in charge of the division of metallurgy, has been very efficient, and has made him one of the most prominent men in the bureau.

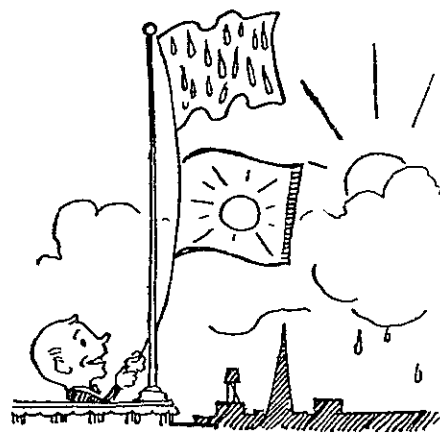
