C. C. TAYLOR CONSIDERS ELECTION SATISFACTORY

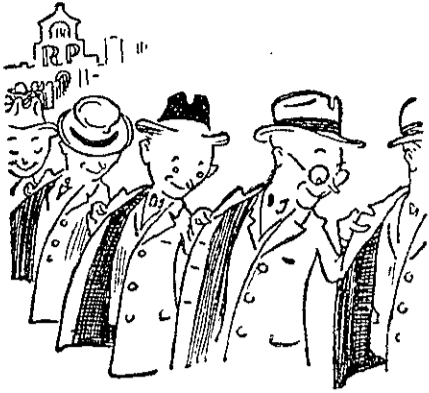

committee, refused to say what he believed the attitude of the body would be on a re-vote. He thought a statement from him would lend a decided bias to the affair, before all the facts had been considered.

C. C. Taylor, in answer to Matt Taylor's proposal, said that this method would be unfair, since with the present standing published, all the candidates would rush their friends to vote, and confusion and politics would reign. He thinks a re-vote is unnecessary and that yesterday's election should stand.

It is declared that Course XV Sophomores left school yesterday at noon, and so many of them, who would have voted in the morning did not. It has also been stated that Junior mechanical engineers had a three hour examination yesterday afternoon, which took so much of their attention that they did not vote. If the polls had been open in the morning, as was planned, these men might have voted. Several Rogers men who were at the voting place in the morning were unable to return in the afternoon. All these points have been brought up by supporters of the re-vote who think yesterday's action unfair.

Several technical points which may serve as a pretext for a re-vote have been brought up. For one thing it is said that the regulation concerning no counting of votes in the balloting place was not complied with. The voting room did not have two doors, which it is accused caused great confusion. There seems to be some dispute about the date of announcement of the nominations and elections. According to the regulations announcement must be made two weeks before elections.



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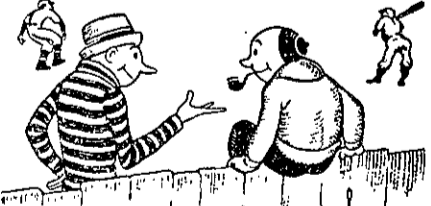
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
