RIFLE TEAM IS STILL IN UNDEFEATED CLASS

B.U. Latest Victim of Engineer Shooters

By defeating Boston University in a dual match last Friday evenings, the Institute rifle team remains undefeated after the second match of the year. In the first engagement of the season, over a week ago, Technology shot a possible score of 500 to win over the University of Maine. Against B. U. their showing was less creditable, the Beaver tally being but 496. However, their Terrier opponents were only able to puncture their pasteboards for 495.

Individual scores for Technology were as follows: Capt. D. M. Creveling '24, 100; F. D. Murphy '25, 99; E. M. Holmes '25, 99; H. C. Cuthbertson '24, 99; J. H. Fielding '25, 99. Each team used its own range.

MAKES TECHNOLOGY POSSIBLE FOR MANY

T.C.A. Seeking Jobs for Men Working Way

Forty-seven members of the Corporation of the Institute and 370 members of the instructing staff have recently been sent letters by the T. C. A. Undergraduate Employment Bureau requesting them to inform the Bureau as to any opportunities they know of for students to obtain part-time or Christmas vacation employment. The T. C. A. is daily receiving numerous requests for employment from freshman, Sophomores, Juniors, and even Seniors who complain that unless they find work they will be forced to leave school. Many inquiries are also received from prospective students asking the possibility of "working their way through."

At present there are 300 men on the Bureau's application files but it has been possible to place only one third of this number. The men now working at positions secured through the T. C. A. reported that in September and October they received \$1,939.65 and in November \$1,150 making a total of \$3,089.65. During the last year the Employment Bureau gave out work to 237 men who reported that they earned a total of \$19,000. Approximately \$9,000 of this was secured by men doing part-time work and \$10,000 by men working during the summer vacation.

WOMAN GRADUATE OF INSTITUTE IS AUTHOR
