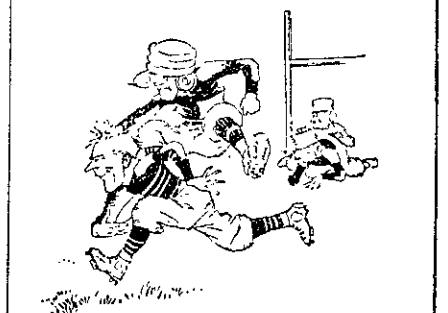

week late he is fined no more than if he does it an hour late. Were the progressive system of fining employed, as is used in most colleges, a man would be fined separately for each offense and the fine would increase in proportion to the tardiness.

The figures bear out the statement that the men are "getting on to themselves." Last year, including summer school, over \$5000 was collected in fines while so far this school year less than \$3000 has been collected.

If a man knows in advance that he will be unable to meet all the registration requirements he may make arrangements with the Bursar or Registrar to secure definite extension of time.
