

### NATATORS WILL SWIM AT AMHERST

Swimmers Oppose Lord Jeff—Close Meet Expected Tomorrow Night

Tomorrow night the varsity tankmen will perform against Amherst in the Lord Jeff pool. This contest with Amherst has always been among the closest that the Beavers have been called upon to figure in. The last two years Technology has won on the last event, the relay, which does not speak of a very large margin to loaf on.

The Engineers are able to present a strong team. There are perhaps none of our swimmers who could be called stars, but on the other hand it would be hard to pick a weak spot on the squad. With the possible exception of the plunge there are men in every event that will be able to press the Lord Jeff natators all the way.

The team has excellent balance and from all reports they will meet at Amherst a squad built much in the same way, so it will be hard to tell which side will be able to walk off with the majority of first places.

One of the Engineers' strongest events is the relay. With the exception of Parsons, who starred on last year's frosh team, all of the relay men are veterans in the event. Ed Taylor, who was on it last year has turned to the breast stroke in order to secure a better balanced team.

Opening Lineup Same as When Against Brown—Cook Still Out

This evening at 8 o'clock in the Hangar gym the varsity basketball team will play the quintet from Stevens Institute. The game will be preceded by a freshman contest against Reading Community, which will start at 7.

So far this season the Beaver passers seem to have been unable to land very often on the top side of their contests, the initial game with Northeastern being their only victory. They have shown steady improvement, however, and have done well considering the losses they have suffered.

**Eager Able to Play**  
Eager, who was put out of the game several weeks ago on account of a sprained ankle, will probably figure again in the game tonight. Captain Stan Cook is still out of commission and there is little hope held forth that he will be able to play again this season.

It looks as if Bill Levi will remain at the guard position, along with Stewart Lankton. Davidson will probably hold on to his new position at forward with Ruff for a partner. With Johnston at center the Engineers will present the same lineup that held to within two points of Brown in the game last week.

**Frosh Meet Reading**  
The freshmen are slated to go up against the Reading Community team. Their game will start at 7 o'clock and will act as a preliminary to the varsity contest. The cubs were overwhelmed by Andover in the last contest that they played. Their trouble seems to be much the same as that which has bothered the varsity this season—too much individual excellence and not enough teamwork.

Coach Wilcox of the cubs has been emphasizing this last most important item. If he has succeeded in drilling enough of learning into his charges the frosh should stand a good chance of coming through with a victory. They have been able to show individual work that is at times brilliant, but their conception of teamwork is rather meagre.

### PRINCETON WINS THREE MAN RELAY

Engineers Stop Race When First Tiger Runner Is Injured in New York

The varsity relay team were confronted with a variety of circumstances in the race with Princeton at the Mill-rice games Wednesday night. In the first lap of the race the Princeton runner who was following Joyce pulled a tendon, and Captain Glen Bateman stopped the run to learn the extent of the injury. The judges decided to award the medals to Technology officially, but as a matter of interest both teams agreed to run a three-fourth mile relay with the remaining three men on each team who had not run.

The Engineers were defeated in this three quarter mile run by the Tiger team, Jeppe coming in about 12 yards behind the Princeton man on the final lap. Howlett, Bateman, and Jeppe made up the Beavers three man team. The race was a close one at times as the Tiger runners did not have things all their own way by any means.

**Veteran Princeton Team**  
The Princeton relay was composed entirely of veterans of last year and presented a fast combination of runners, but the average time of the Engineers was good at 52.2. In the last two laps Bateman and Jeppe put up a mighty good race and closed up the distances between their opponents by quite a bit.

COLGATE TEAM BRINGS UNUSUAL HEAVYWEIGHT

In the last meet, Ed Moll went in the 175 pound bout in place of Brockelman as there was no unlimited bout. In the Colgate meet, the team faces two issues, either to place Moll in both the lightweight and unlimited classes or to enter Brockelman, as yet inexperienced, in one of these classes.
