

BASKETBALL TEAM LOSES IN TWO CONTESTS

Brooklyn Tech And City College Defeat Beavers

CLOSE GUARDING HOLDS BROOKLYN SCORE DOWN LOW

Small Floor Handicaps Engineer Passers—Davidson Is Leading Scorer

In a fast and hard fought game the varsity basketballers lost to the Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute five Friday night by the score of 19-13. The guards of both teams were on the job from start to finish of the contest and the forwards had very little opportunity to take a shot at the basket. The passing and general floor work of the Engineers was good and it was only the letting up of the defense once or twice that allowed the Brooklyn passers to cage the additional goals.

The Beaver quintet was somewhat handicapped by the size of the floor and the walls that were built close to the outside lines. The small floor space made it difficult to work the team formations as it was impossible to get under way before the Brooklyn guards broke up the plays. The Polytechnic team got their plays off in quick order as they were used to the floor.

Guarding Is Close
As the score indicates the close guarding of both teams was the feature of the game. No man on either side secured more than two goals, and the goals that were caged were the result of clever team work. The referee had his hands full calling the fouls

Dartmouth Wins Hockey Game By Wide Margin 12-1

Green Team Runs Through Beaver Defense—McPherson Gets Only Goal

The varsity hockey team was overwhelmed by Dartmouth Saturday afternoon when the Green team defeated the Engineers 12-1 at Hanover. After the first ten minutes the Technology defense broke down and the Dartmouth forwards had things pretty well their own way. The Green team started off with a whirlwind attack but Captain Denton Massey was more than a match for the opposing forwards and allowed no scoring.

But when the first period was about half over, the Green attack began to register and Captain Hall scored twice and Manser once. This was the extent of the scoring for the first half.

Score At Will in Periods
In the second and third periods Dartmouth secured four and five goals respectively. Captain Massey was bombarded with the puck and although he

FROSH PUCKSTERS BOW TO ANDOVER

Penalties Hold Beavers Down—Teams Evenly Matched—Frosh Improve

The freshmen hockey team was defeated by Andover 3-0 last Saturday in a hard fought game which brought out a display of good hockey from both sides. The teams were pretty evenly matched and if the referee had not been so particular the score would have been reduced by two points. The first goal was a lucky one, the puck hitting one of the frosh sticks which sent it between the posts. The second was scored while the goal-tender was off the ice, and the third was a clear shot in the last period. The ice was in excellent condition, and the Beaver cubs were on their toes from start to finish.

Frosh Goalie in Box
During the first period the frosh team had the edge on Andover most of the time. Toward the end in a squabble around the cub goal the puck hit one of the frosh sticks and was sent between his own posts. Later the goal-tender fell down and was put off for two minutes for kneeling on the ice. This considerably weakened the

ENGINEERS STAGE LIVELY BATTLE IN INITIAL PERIOD

Davidson Again Stars—Makes Five Baskets in First Half

In the second game of the New York trip the Technology basketballers bowed to the City College team Saturday night, the score being 33-20. The game was fast and cleanly played throughout, and it was not until the second half that the New York passers secured a commanding lead over the Beaver team. This victory for City College was the ninth straight win that the College quintet has chalked up this season, and they have a record of losing only one or two contests on the home floor in three years.

The first half of the game was a close and hard fought battle with the advantage going from one team to the other until at the end of this first period Technology was four points behind their opponents, the score standing at 18-14.

Davidson Gets Five Goals
Davidson was the leading factor in keeping the Engineers in the running for the first half. He broke loose from the College defense and shot five goals in succession before he was finally held down. It was not only with shooting that Davidson aided the team but his passing and floor work kept the opposing guard on the jump.

At the start of the second half the City College quintet started to score and they were never in danger for the remainder of the period. Schein for City College was the outstanding player, in addition to his fast work at center he led his teammates in the number of goals shot, as he caged a total of five, but they were distributed throughout the game and were not secured in succession as were Davidsons.

Line-up Is the Same
Coach Warren started the same team against City College as opposed Brooklyn the night before Davidson, Lankton, Johnston, Levi, and Caine making up the quintet. The scoring was better distributed among the players than it was in the Brooklyn game, as Lankton, Johnston, and Forrester each caged a goal.

The College five piled up a good advantage in score by putting in 11 free throws to the Engineer's four.

The Exeter quintet secured 30 points in the second part of the game.

Engel and Umbenhauer played a very good game for the frosh and Jenkins and Innerasky secured eight out of the 20 points made by the yearling team. The game was very fast and cleanly played. No one was forced to leave the game because of personal fouls.

Exeter made the first three baskets as the frosh were not used to the floor, but the cubs had a scoring streak for a few minutes when they scored four baskets in succession. As soon as the Academy team came back for the second period they started to roll up a high score and effectually prevented the cubs from getting within scoring distance of their goal.

RIFLEMEN DEFEAT MCGILL—997-956

Seven Perfect Scores Made Out of Ten—Canadian Targets Used

The varsity rifle team defeated the University of McGill in a prone match which ended last Saturday by a score of 997 to 956 out of a possible 1000. Ten men were allowed to shoot, the distance being 75 feet and Canadian targets were used.

Seven men shot perfect scores of 100, while four others turned in cards of 99. The men have never shot at Canadian targets before which are somewhat different than the ones to which they have become accustomed. Considering these facts the high score of the team is exceedingly creditable.

NEW STROKE FOR CREW EXPLAINED BY VARSITY MAN

Bill Haines and Leader of Yale Chief Eastern Supporters of New School

MUCH PRACTICE NEEDED TO LEARN NEW STROKE.

Crew supporters are making a big drive this week to place before the students the necessity of winter workouts on the machines as a preliminary to the actual rowing on the water in the spring. Coach Haines is teaching the men a stroke different from that heretofore used at Technology and this work is necessary to ground the men in the fundamentals.

The following is an article written by a member of the varsity, explaining the new stroke:
"Rowing is a combination of common sense, mechanics, rhythm, time, and uniformity. Several systems or strokes have been used which have varied in success as they have attained these qualities.

"For a number of years past the eastern college crews, including the Technology crews, have used what might be called the Eastern Stroke. Though it had its variations throughout the different colleges, it consisted generally in a hard catch with considerable body swing, and depended a great deal on the physical condition and strength of the crew.

Haines Leads New School
"Now comes a new school, Haines at Technology, Leader at Yale and some of the coaches on the west coast, with some variations of course, have brought out a new stroke.

"The power of the stroke is delivered from a good catch simultaneously with back and legs, and a smooth, firm, pull through, finishing slightly beyond the perpendicular, with legs, body and hands exactly together. A quick drop of the inside wrist and a well controlled slide recovery complete the stroke.

"The pull up on the toe straps is minimized. In fact, Bill Haines has had them removed from the machines for this early practice. The whole thing so approaches the ideal that there is a much greater run of the boat per stroke than with the old system.

"Last year Yale and Washington swept the country. This year Bill Haines, with the makings of a powerful eight, expects to do a little sweeping on his own hook."

The frosh R. O. T. C. team has concluded its meet with the University of Delaware. It was a four position contest, the frosh rifles scoring 798 out of a possible 1000.

FIFTH HANDICAP MEET BRINGS OUT TRACK MEN

The handicap track meet held Saturday afternoon brought out a sufficient number of men so it was possible to hold six track events and three field. In the 300 yard run Joyce led the field for the greater part of the time, but at the finish Tonry crept up and was on even terms with Joyce at the tape. Captain Ambach won both the high and low hurdles, being timed at 9-4 in the high and 6-2 in the low.

The shot put went to Small with Glantzberg and Brodsky second and third. Ballentine took the broad jump with a leap of 18 ft. 9 ins., while Dexter got first in the high jump.

Saturday was a big day for the Engineer teams, both the varsity and the freshmen had meets in various sports. Both hockey teams got into action, both basketball teams and both wrestling teams did their stuff.

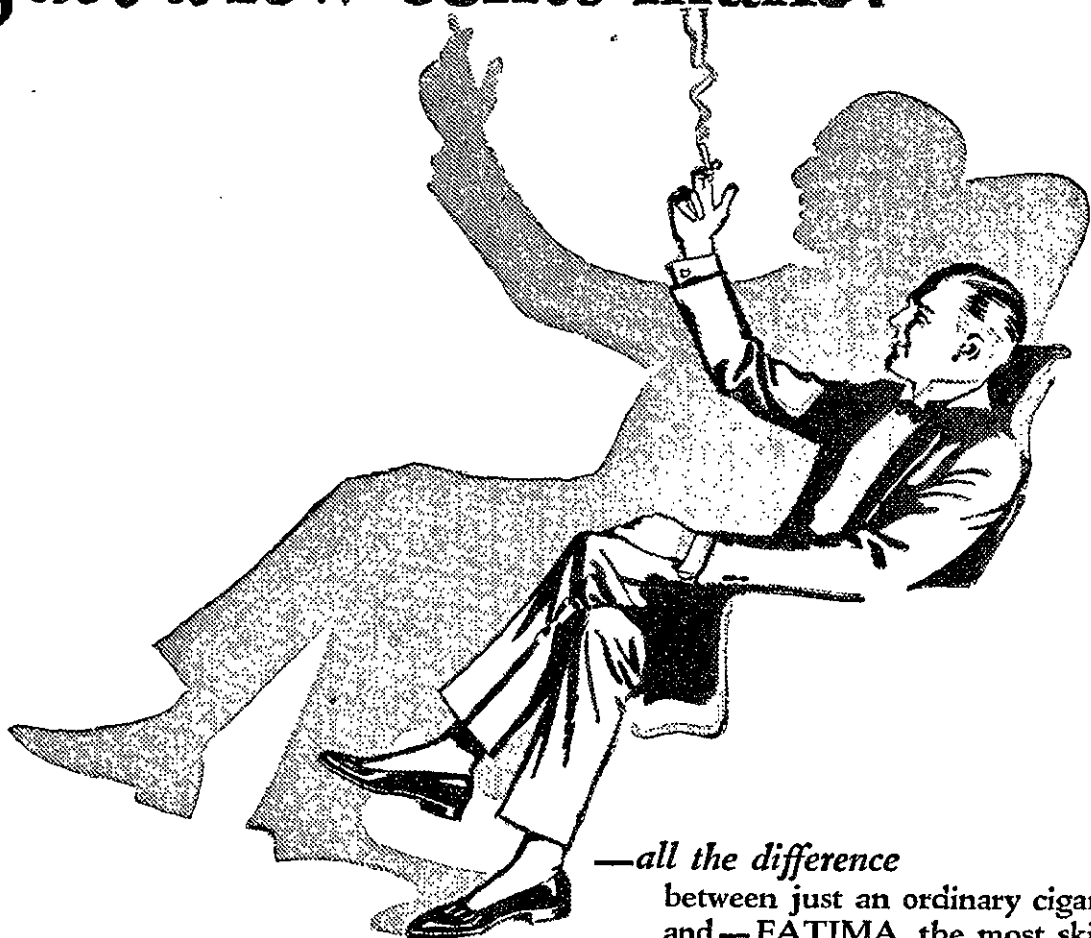
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
