

### VARSITY MATMEN LOSE TO HARVARD

Rock Hereford Is the Only Engineer to Secure Decision

The varsity wrestling team lost to the Harvard matmen last night in the Hangar by the score of 22-3, Rock Hereford being the only Engineer to obtain a decision. The one-sided aspect of the score gives no indication of the stubbornly contested nature of many of the bouts. The full time limit was very nearly taken up in a number of the matches.

In the 115-lb. bout Coyle of the Engineers lost a decision to Goldberg of the Crimson team. This match was a fast struggle until Coyle was caught off his guard. Cummings started off well but finally succumbed to Stearns in the 125-lb. division.

Norwood was forced to accept defeat in the 135-lb. match with Morris Michgleson of Harvard. Norwood lost by a decision. In the 145-lb. class Drinnel was defeated by Karelity.

Rock Hereford was the only Beaver wrestler to get a decision. He defeated Evans in about seven minutes. Hereford has not lost a match this season. Captain Greer was thrown by Hayne in the 175-lb. class. In the last bout Bradford of Harvard won over Tyron.

In a seesaw basketball game the Theta Chi fraternity defeated Sigma Alpha Epsilon last night in the Hangar Gym. Both teams were fairly evenly matched but lacked sadly the scoring ability to cage goals.

At the first half Sigma Alpha Epsilon was leading the victors by 5 to 0 when M. Davier struck a scoring streak, getting two field goals and a free throw, which tied the score for the victors. A penalty put S. A. E. in the lead again but a field goal put the game on ice for Theta Chi. The final score was 7 to 6.

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### VARSITY MERMEN WILL SWIM YALE IN Y.M.C.A. POOL

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Saturday evening at 8.15 in the Y. M. C. A. pool on Huntington Avenue the varsity swimming team will meet Yale. Yale has one of the strongest swimming teams in the country. Last year they had a championship combination, and so far this season they are undefeated. In the eastern intercollegiate swimming league Yale stands first, having won three meets and lost none. Princeton is second in the league thus far, having had only one meet, from which the Tiger tankmen emerged victorious. The University of Pennsylvania ranks third, having both won and lost two encounters.

**Yale Swamped Penn**  
Last Saturday the Eli representatives triumphed over the University of Pennsylvania by the runaway victory of 46½ to 15½. The Yale tankers won all but one event. Bob Phillips, a veteran of last year's championship Yale team, hung up a new intercollegiate record, swimming the 200 yard breast-stroke in 2 minutes, 54 2-10 seconds. This lowered the mark set on January 3, in the Pennsylvania pool, by Weigand of Princeton. Yale's relay team makes the sensational claim of consisting of four 25-second men.

Yale also has some of the prettiest divers in the east, and in general it will be a rare opportunity to see some first-class swimming. Tickets for this meet will cost 50 cents, and will be on sale in all of the fraternity houses, main sporting goods stores, and in the main lobby from 12 to 2 today and Saturday. ### BASKETBALL TEAM TO MEET VERMONT

Vermont Team the Strongest Five Yet to Oppose Engineers

With games scheduled for tonight and Saturday night of this week, the Varsity basketball team will have a rather heavy program. Tonight's game is with the strong University of Vermont quintet, and will be played in the Hangar. With the possible exception of the Tufts College five, the Vermont outfit is the strongest foe the Engineers are likely to encounter this season. They are considered about five points better than the University of New Hampshire team at their best, and have been playing a whirlwind game all season. They have met and defeated such teams as Yale and New York University, and have lost only one game, that to Princeton, by a small margin. In view of these comparative scores, the chances for a win by the Engineers do not look very bright. If, however, they play as they did against C. C. N. Y. two weeks ago, they ought to manage to keep the score down pretty well.

### FRESHMAN BOXERS SHUT OUT OF BOUTS

The boxers of the St. Johns team had things all their own way last evening in the Hangar gym when they defeated the Technology yearlings 6-0. Some of the rounds were won by the Engineers but the St. John's boys had the better knowledge of the game for the most part.

Ogden of St. John's, who had secured a win in the 125-lb. division, got a decision against Kwok in the 115-lb. bout.

In the 125-lb. class Longnecker of the Engineers lost to Ogden. The first round was close but the second and third were all Ogden's. Flint, in the 135-lb. division, was defeated by Bryde, the St. John's man taking two out of three rounds. Flint put up a mighty good fight at the start but lost out later.

Famel and Holvinghead put up a merry battle in the 145-lb. bout but Holvinghead had a little too much experience for the Engineer yearling and so took the majority of the rounds. However, the third round was practically even.

Brady defeated Lammert for the 160-lb. title. As in the previous bout the Technology man made a good beginning but did not keep it up. Lammert boxed a very neat first round but Brady became too strong in the second and third rounds.

Technology forfeited the 175-lb. bout to Jacobs as the freshman who was to have entered had just been in a wrestling match.

### Frosh Wrestlers In Close Matches

Although Captain Frank defeated his man in one of the best matches seen in the Hangar for many a day, the freshmen lost a hard fought meet to the Harvard yearlings last night by the score of 18-11. Practically all the bouts were fast and hotly contested and it was not until the last match that the final result was determined. The frosh took three out of seven bouts. Captain Frank cannot be given too much credit for the way he performed. His opponent was Captain Wood of the Crimson who had plenty of ability, and it took all Frank's tricks to get a decision.

In the 115-lb. class Powell of Technology lost to Turner of Harvard by a fall. Powell was outweighed by about 12 lbs., so Turner had quite an advantage over the Engineer. The Harvard wrestler secured the fall in 3 minutes 28 secs.

Metzer gave Kulleman of the Crimson team a hard battle before he was thrown by a head chancer and an arm lock. Kulleman was a little more experienced than Metzer, but it took 5 minutes and 6 seconds for him to obtain a fall.

In the 135-lb. division Hinkle of Harvard secured a decision over Rabinowitz of the Beavers in 1 minute 28 seconds.

**Frank in Great Bout**  
The 145 lb. division afforded the best bout of the evening. The captains of the two teams, Captain Frank of Technology and Captain Wood of Harvard, staged a hard battle to determine the victor. It was nip and tuck from the start, with the advantage going from one to the other. Captain Frank got his victory by a time decision in 5 minutes. The bout was one of the clearest matches seen on the Technology mat this season.

Captain Frank started the ball rolling for the Engineers, as the next two bouts were wins for Technology. In the 158 lb. class Giles defeated Campbell by a time decision in 6 minutes and 10 seconds. Burke in the 175 lb. division secured a fall from Bahavall in 8 minutes 2 5/8 seconds. He used a head lock very effectively and finally got his fall by a double bar lock.

In the unlimited bout Ayre of Harvard defeated Volante in quick order, the time being 23 seconds.

The Gym Team is in for a hard schedule this week and with meets on consecutive days with two of the strongest colleges in the east. The team leaves tonight for their first meet with University of Pennsylvania tomorrow and goes from there direct to Annapolis where the Navy meet will be held on Saturday.

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
