Gold Medal Awarded Winner In Each Class

Entries for the All-Tech Wrestling Tournament must be registered with Coach Ricks, of the wrestling team, before noon on Wednesday, December 10. Any man connected with the Institute is eligible to compete, according to the rulings this year, this clause admitting any athletically inclined professors or graduate students who have not previously obtained letters for wrestling at the Institute.

At the time of registration, the hour of the match will be decided, and will be posted a day later. All matches will be held in the Hangar Gym, between the hours of 4:30 and 6:00 on the evenings of December 11-13; any spectators will be admitted free.

Koller Expected to Win

Each man competing will be allowed three pounds overweight in his class, all of the eight regular classes being run, the lowest being the 118-pounders, followed by the 126, 135, 145, 155, 165, 175, and the unlimited heavyweight division. Koller '33 was predicted a probable winner of the heavyweight bouts, by the coach, and equally promising seem the chances of Wesley Van Buren in the 135-pound class. All rules will be according to the National Intercollegiate Wrestling Association, the only additional one being the one barring any man who has won a Varsity letter in the sport previously. It is specially emphasized that any Tech man may enter, the competition not being closed to team candidates alone. Gold medals are to be awarded to the first place winner in each class, these being different from the awards of last year.

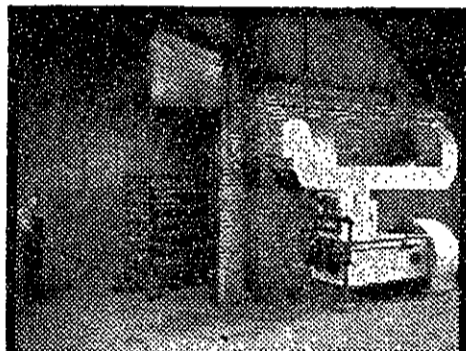

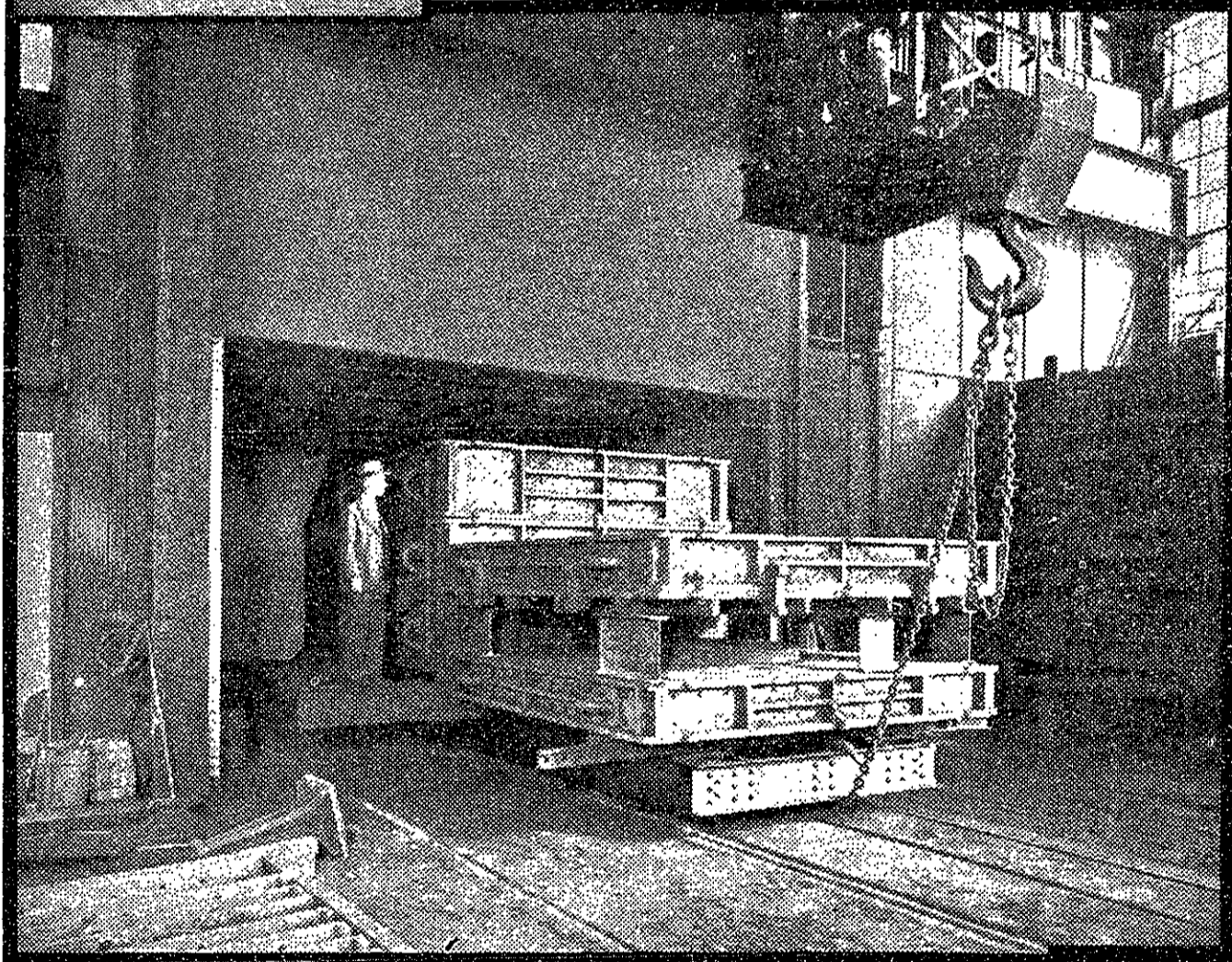

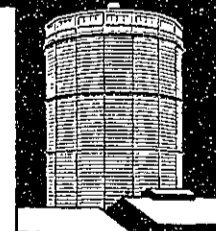
