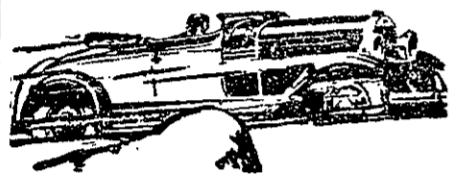

Additional expenses would be difficult to bear. Genrich then explained that the custom of throwing eggs was an innovation of last year, and that in only one year its use had grown to alarming proportions. He warned the committeemen that the practice would probably continue to grow each year unless some means were taken to curb it, and that if the present expenses, it would discourage repetition of the practice.

Freshman Gives Views

The freshman viewpoint was presented by Sayward H. Farnum, '34, who said that at freshman camp and many times since then the freshmen had been urged to take active part in their class activities. If they were forced to carry these unexpected expenses, it would be very difficult for the class. He further suggests that some fund should be set aside for such emergencies, and that the classes should only have to pay when a certain stipulated amount was exceeded. In reply to this Backus explained that a fund of \$150, had been set aside for this very purpose, but that unnecessary expenses had far exceeded this amount. Goodhand added to this by saying that regardless of who bore the expense, the practice of throwing eggs should be curtailed.

Motion is Defeated

Gilbert M. Roddy, '31, then arose and stressed the fact that it would be bad for the lower classes to use their activity money for these expenses, but since the bills are due they must be paid whether they come from this source or some other. "If money can be gathered from some other source, well and good, but if it cannot, the burden should not be placed upon the Athletic Association."

Following the discussion the question was voted on and the original motion was defeated. It was finally decided that power should be given to the Executive Committee to deal with the situation as it found expedient.
