Prof. Harvey A. Wooster, Head of the Department of Economics at Oberlin College, and at present Visiting Professor of Economics at Tufts College, addressed the Faculty Club yesterday noon at a luncheon meeting. The luncheon was held in the Faculty Dining Room in Walker Memorial. Prof. Wooster discussed the Unemployment Problem, which is at present the subject of much thought and consideration. Having been at one time Special Expert on Unemployment for the U. S. Tariff Commission, Prof. Wooster was well able to present the cause and effects of the present situation.

**HOLIDAY DEPUTATION
ARRANGED BY T. C. A.**

During the holidays, one deputation was arranged by the Deputations Department of the T. C. A. F. Rolf Moral '32, of Barcelona, Spain, and Preben Oldenburg '33, of Copenhagen, Denmark, took part in International Night at the Second Congregational Church, Dorchester, on Sunday, Dec. 28.

Five foreign students from neighboring colleges made addresses on the general theme "What Christianity Has Meant to My Nation." About a hundred and fifty people were present.

BOOK LIST

MARGARET FULLER by Margaret Bell. Charles Boni Company. \$1.50

In this biography of Margaret Fuller, Miss Bell presents her material on an interesting life in a charming manner. She makes no attempt to introduce new ideas; her book appeals by virtue only of good substance well told.

Margaret Fuller, America's foremost woman of the nineteenth century, is best known not for her writings but for her ideas on feminism, which she most effectively expressed in the oral word. One of the greatest feminists of all times, her belief is contained in the short statement—"It is a vulgar error that love—a love—is to woman her whole existence."

The book is divided into three parts. The first two, Preparation and Experimentation, treat of her life in this country, of her education, of her work as a teacher and author and sybil of the intellectual world. This portion of the book is unusually good because of its main characters, who are no less than Emerson, Thoreau, Greeley, Hawthorne, Channing and Bronson Alcott. In no other book do such men appear as background to set off the personality of a feminine friend. The advantage of their description as such lies in the fact that here they are more intimate, more human, less exaggerated. Emerson was Margaret's dearest and most revered friend, Greeley and Alcott her co-workers.

In the third section, Miss Fuller goes abroad to commune with Carlyle and Wordsworth, George Sand and Chopin. In Rome, she aids the Italian revolutionists, after her meeting with the famous Mazzini, whose extraordinary ability it was to convert mere acquaintances to ardent partisans.

Her life reaches fulfillment when at last love visits her, and she becomes, quite simply, a wife and mother. Her husband, the Marquis Ossoli, is intelligent and kind, but no intellectual. No inconsistency is felt in Miss Fuller's marriage, however, for her feminist views were not so absurd as to hold that marriage curtails a woman's power or capacity for intellectual development. She always maintained that the ideal companionship of the sexes was the prime requisite of normal living.

Miss Bell's book will command wide reading as a well-written biography of a most interesting person. The reader realizes from the wealth of details that the picture is a faithful one, and that the author has kept perpetually in view the true personality of her subject. Also, Miss Bell has excellently adapted her style to her substance; quietness of manner and refinement of expression are most welcome characteristics of a book written and published when others are being acclaimed merely because they are startling.

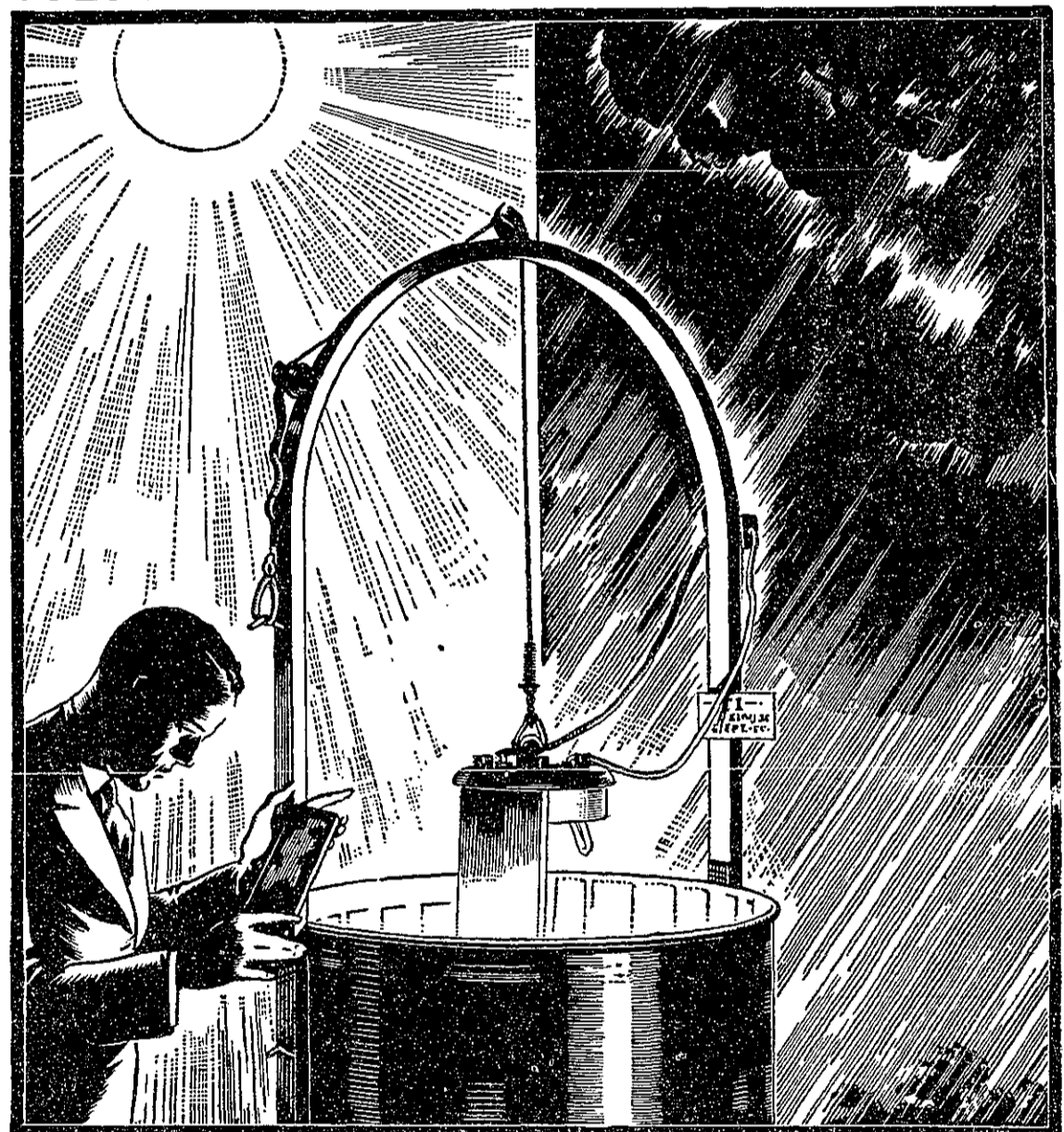
