

Harrison Retires As Head Of AIP, Replaced By Seitz

Dean of Science George R. Harrison retired on March 13 as chairman of the American Institute of Physics, a position he has held for seven years. He was succeeded by Prof. Frederick Seitz of the University of Chicago.

The American Institute of Physics, an amalgamation of several physics societies, was founded in 1931, largely through the efforts of Dr. Karl Compton, who was its first chairman. Its present membership consists of about 15,000 American physicists.
