

Discussion Of Dormitories Held In Pres. Killian's Home

Friday evening thirty dormitory residents met with members of the administration at President Killian's home to discuss dormitory government and regulations. Representing the administration, besides Dr. Killian were Horace Ford of the Corporation, Dean E. Francis Bowditch, Joseph J. Snyder, Treasurer of the Institute, Professor Powell, Professor John Rule and Dr. Dana Farnsworth.

It was recognized early in the discussion, that a basic problem lies in communication between the Dean's office, student government and the students. It was suggested that there was a need for more "bull sessions" similar to the one being held and that there should be discussions with wider groups of students.

Al Gough, treasurer of Dormitory Committee, stated that the approach to the solution to the present problem concerning dormitory government should be in three steps. 1—a statement from the administration of the trends of student government; 2—clear up the present explosive situation; and 3—work for future, establish better lines of communication.

Dr. Killian replied to this by outlining the overall trend of Institute policy.

He claimed that the trend is toward more freedom, more autonomy and more responsibility. This trend finds educational expression in a recent revision of the freshman curriculum allowing more individual planning and less regimentation. It finds expression in student life in the liberal open house rules and dormitory regulations. At one time, the President noted, students were required to sign leases which forbade liquor and women in the rooms.

President Killian further stated that despite the fact that we are moving toward more freedom, rights may

A partner in A. T. Kearney & Co. since 1940, Mr. Smith was formerly director of personnel at Marshall Field & Co. in Chicago and is a past president of the National Association of Cost Accountants.

After receiving the degrees of Bachelor of Science and Master of Business Administration from the Northwestern University School of Commerce, Mr. Smith served successively on the faculties of the University of Georgia, Northwestern University and Ohio State University.

From 1929 to 1931 he was Assistant Secretary of the National Association of Cost Accountants, and from 1931 to 1933 he was Assistant Professor in the School of Commerce at Northwestern University.

He later served as a staff member with James O. McKinsey & Co., management consultants, Chicago; Assistant General Manager of Operations, The Kroger Co., Cincinnati; and Director of Personnel, Marshall Field & Co., Chicago.

Mr. Smith, who is a certified public accountant in Illinois, has spoken extensively throughout the country before business and professional groups, and has contributed numerous articles to professional journals.

Station WGBH, operated by the Lowell Institute Cooperative Broadcasting Council, is one of thirteen stations in the country to appear on Variety magazine's Honor Roll of Radio-TV Stations for 1952-53.

WGBH is the only FM and only education station to receive the Variety Plaque Award in this year's Variety Show Management Contest. In the citation the editors of this magazine of the movie, radio and TV industries declare: "... In its first year of operation WGBH, a project of the Lowell Institute Cooperative Broadcasting Council, demonstrated that a Frequency Modulation station effectively managed and imaginatively programmed can build a substantial place for itself in a large TV-AM city, and that a group of varied educational organizations can get together and cooperatively develop an important broadcasting operation. . . Unlike some commercial stations, WGBH brought to its special audiences not just teasing samples of intellectual radio fare, but good talk, good music, good ideas as staple diet in rich and rewarding abundance. . ."

Earlier last week two WGBH programs took top honors at the Ohio State Institute for Education by Radio-TV. The programs receiving awards in this annual competition in educational radio and TV were "Tomorrow's Symphony," a preview of the weekly Boston Symphony Orchestra concert with G. 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Lightweight Crew Opener Taken By Beaver Varsity

Dozens of cheering spectators were on hand at the Charles River Basin last Saturday to watch the collegiate crew opener between Harvard, Boston University, Rutgers and Tech.

The lightweight races were run off first and the frosh race was won by the Harvard First boat, which finished two and one half lengths ahead of the Beaver frosh. Tabor Academy finished second and the Crimson second boat finished in a dead heat with the Tech crew. Harvard's winning time was 7:35.7; the Techmen finished in 7:47.8.

The Harvard jayvee crew finished a comfortable four lengths ahead of the handicapped Beaver crew. Two Techmen were out because of illness and in a last-minute substitution, two freshmen were allowed to row.

The most spectacular race of the afternoon was the lightweight varsity race in which Tech nosed out a quarter-length victory over Harvard. Taking an early lead, the Beaver crew found itself a full length ahead with three quarters of a mile left in the race. Val Skov, the sophomore stroke, settled down to a 32½ beat racing stroke and the Techmen fought all the way. With one half mile left in the race, Harvard increased the stroke and pulled even with the Tech boat. With but twenty strokes left, the Techmen put on an amazing sprint and went ahead to beat the Crimson.

Harvard made a clean sweep of the heavyweight races later in the afternoon. In the Frosh race, the Techmen took an early lead but were stopped cold by a full crab as the Crimson pulled ahead. Straining all the way, the Frosh came back to take a second place with Boston U. coming in third and Rutgers fourth.

In the Jayvee race the Tech crew fought a losing battle as Harvard won handily.

In the varsity race the Techmen took an early three-quarter length lead over the other three crews. Before the race was half over, however, Harvard swept by the Beaver Oarsmen. After the Crimson pulled ahead, Rutgers followed and the Techmen were nosed out by B. U. in the last quarter mile.

14 Inning Thriller Lost To Bowdoin; Colby Wins, 7-3

After a three-run outburst in the first inning, the Beaver bats were silenced for the remainder of the game against Colby on Friday, April 24. The Maine stickers overcame the deficit in the top of the second and went on to rack up a 7-5 win.

Tech scored on hits by Rush, Morganstern, and White and an out by Valerio. White's hit was a long two-bagger, the only extra base hit of the game.

Roland L. Plante '53 started for the Engineers and gave way to Allen Schultz '54 in the big second inning, when Colby scored five times. Hugh Hauser '55 relieved Schultz and finished up the game.

One of the deciding factors in the game was the wildness of the Tech pitchers, who walked a total of 14 batters. Tech outit Colby six to four, but ineffective hurling overshadowed our batting edge. Hauser did, however, strike out six batters to lead in that department.

Error Costly

After putting up a fine battle for 13 innings, the Tech defense collapsed momentarily in the 14th, and Bowdoin pushed across three runs to break a 3-3 tie. After making a great comeback in the ninth, the loss was a heartbreaker for the team and for pitcher Ted Slosek '54.

Slosek pitched the entire game, and did a fine job. In contrast with the wildness exhibited by Beaver pitchers the day before, he walked but six.

Voluntary Student Aid To Help Multiplicity Of WSSF Projects

Carnivals are fun and when there is a real purpose behind them, they become more enjoyable. The National Student Association sponsored carnival this Saturday is of that type. Its purpose is to help raise money for the World Student Service Fund to enable it to carry out its projects of students aiding each other in a mutual assistance program of relief and international education.

Working with twenty-two other national committees WSSF has helped to rebuild universities devastated by war. They have extended the program lately to recognize needs as well as resources.

Priority Projects

In a meeting of the Annual Assembly of the World University Service, delegates from all national committees prepared a total world program. Priority projects were chosen which would combine the relief of immediate needs with an attempt to work out solutions to basic university problems.

Japanese students, for instance, who learn to use typewriters provided by WUS in a self-help scheme, are then able to earn their university fees with their acquired skill.

Hostels And Mensas

At the Student Health Conference held in Singapore several years ago, the experiences of various countries in operating student clinics and plans for fundamental improvement of university health facilities were ex-

changed. The Combloux Rest Center in France which provides physical rehabilitation for convalescent and undernourished students is another red feather in WUS's cap. Of course all projects are administered on the basis of need without regard to race, religion or political opinion.

In India and Pakistan, WSSF has contributed to hundreds of homeless students the maintenance of student Hostels (living centers). Similar provisions are made for students in Athens, Berlin, Bombay, Hamburg, Cairo, Aachen, Delhi, Calcutta. Assistance is also given to other cooperative student dining rooms called Mensas to provide free meal coupons to those who need them.

Lone Campaign Of Year

On American campuses, WSSF represents the Care Book Program and the UNESCO Gift Coupon Plan. WSSF provides American students with a national organization which is a member committee of WUS. Sponsoring WSSF are the United Student Christian Council, the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundations, the Newman Club Federation and the U. S. National Student Association. Campaigns each year, such as the carnival this Saturday are the only nationally organized means for student to student giving.

WSSF is endorsed by UNESCO, the Association of American Colleges, the American Association of Junior Colleges and is an Associate Member of the American Council on Education and a member of the American Council of Voluntary Agencies.

Arthur Taub will lead the discussion which will be held in Crafts Lounge at 5:00 p.m.

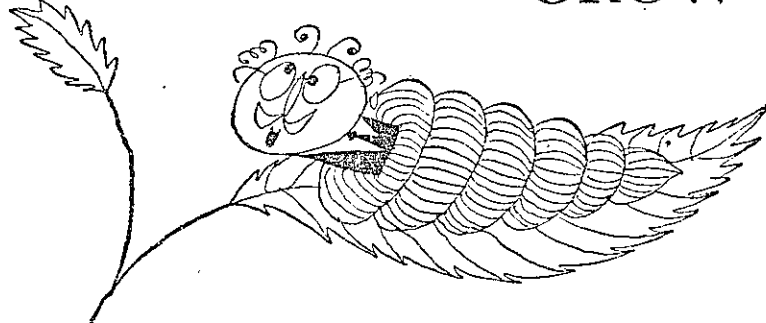

Failure to score consistently in the field events prevented the Tech track squad from being victorious over a Springfield aggregation last Saturday afternoon in the season's first outdoor meet, as Springfield won, 74-61.

Although Tech compiled a 48-24 lead on the track, mainly in the runs and hurdles, Springfield more than made up the deficit in the field events, winning all but one, in which they tied for first.

Beavers Sweep Three Races

Coach Oscar Hedlund's runners registered three sweeps, in the high hurdles, the mile run and the 880 yard run. Latoff, Munroe and Chihoski all crossed the finish line in that order to whitewash Springfield in the high hurdles. Latoff's 5.2 time tied a M.I.T. A.A. mark set by Jester in '41.

The 880 yard run provided an interesting finish. It seemed that the Tech runners did not only want to win the race, but they also intended to do so together, producing a dead heat. Therefore, about 20 yards in front of the tape, Schreiber, Grenier and Farquhar united, and, holding hands, crossed the finish ahead of their opposition. The judges, though returned a verdict of "no dead heat," claiming that no such wonderful device existed. The judges must be congratulated on excellent timing, and depth of perception. The crowd, including this reporter, standing on the finish line, saw what seemed to be a dead heat; the stop watches produced identical times of 2:01.3 minutes; but the judges, after due deliberation, declared Schreiber the winner, Grenier next and Farquhar third.

Shapiro and McGrew combined efforts to outscore Springfield in the pole vault event, the only field event won by Tech. Shapiro tied for first, while McGrew captured third place.

Freshmen Victorious

Even though Morefield, shot put expert for the Frosh, was not able to compete because of illness, the freshmen had little trouble whipping Springfield's Frosh 44½ - 31½. Hoffman took all three of the dashes, the 100, 220 and 440, to score 15 points. In fact, the frosh only lost in the shot put, and the discus, in which Springfield managed a sweep.

In the next meet on Saturday, May 2, the Cardinal and Grey track squad will compete against Tufts here. The meet will start at 2:30 p. m.

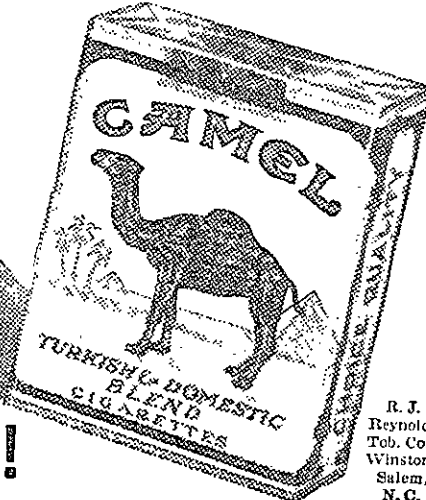
