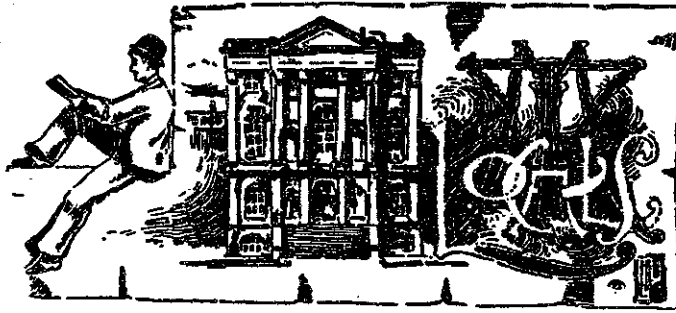




The corrected proofs of the list of students for the new catalogue have been posted.
