

Technology Civic Club.

The Technology Civic Club organized last Friday, May 13, in Room 10, Pierce. Officers were elected as follows: President, A. P. Mathesius; vice-president, H. M. Wilcox; secretary, M. E. Vinton, Jr.; treasurer, W. F. Englis. An Executive Committee, consisting of the above men, and Mr. Ferry, of the Institute, was appointed and instructed to prepare a constitution. Assemblyman Furber, of the 10th Boston district, addressed the Club on the subject of the responsibility and opportunity of the college man in present-day politics.

For the benefit of those not acquainted with the impulses which have led to the formation of this Club, it may be stated that its object is to promote interest among the students here in political questions of the day, and to aid men who feel interested in understanding the issues at stake in the coming Presidential election.

Baseball.

The interclass championship series, while not seriously cutting into the patronage of the American League, has drawn two small but enthusiastic crowds to the Boston College grounds. These grounds leave much to be desired, as they are still in an unfinished state, and the crowd, being forced to stand, naturally collects along the base lines and is almost as much in the game as the players. On Wednesday the 1907 team won out by making four more hits and one less error than their opponents. The game was slow and uninteresting, the only features being a sensational catch by Lampie of a badly misjudged fly. In the sixth, Hosmer was given first on a close decision. The 1906 fielders, believing him to be out, all started in; Hosmer thereupon started for second, and Gregson, on general principles, threw the ball for the bag. Haley coming in from center arrived at the base simultaneously with the ball and tagging the runner, completed as odd a play as is often seen. Neither Billings

nor Gregson were able to puzzle the Freshmen, who scored almost at will, while Barnard pitched a very acceptable game, striking out eight men.
