

In May, 1901, the Committee on Award of the Cabot Prizes recommended:

1. That the prizes be offered at the beginning of each school year to those students who, in the judgment of a committee appointed by the president, have made marked improvement from attention to physical training during the year.
2. That these prizes consist of bronze medals, which shall be known as the Cabot Medals for Improvement in Physical Training, and that no distinction of rank be made in awarding them.
3. That the number to be awarded each year be left to the discretion of the Committee of Award, and be determined by the number of men whom the committee shall consider to have made sufficient physical improvement to entitle them to the honor.

The first award of bronze medals was made in 1901 to H. B. Pulsifer, Richard Shoal, G. D. Wilson, W. A. Kemper, B. D. Solomon.

Since then the awards have been as follows: In 1902, L. W. Adams, J. F. Ancona, G. H. Clapp, W. C. Phalen, J. B. Whitmore. Honorable mention: L. E. Edes, H. Eisele, L. E. Ovington, F. B. Poole, W. N. Taylor, G. D. Wilson.

In 1903, awards to E. F. Parker, Jr., L. F. Buell, W. N. Munroe, R. G. Kennedy, G. K. Kaiser. Honorable mention: E. B. Rowe, J. F. Ancona, R. P. Stebbins, E. M. Smith, H. S. Wilkins.

It is to be regretted that the delay in the arrival of the die from Paris has prevented the presentation of the medals until this year.

The medals will be on exhibition in the autumn, and the committee hopes that their intrinsic worth and the value to the student of the development for which they stand will arouse a widespread and active interest among the undergraduates.

The Worcester Meet.

Technology was not so fortunate at Worcester this year as last, as we were only able to take fifth place, where last year we pressed Williams closely for second. Our team was handicapped by the absence of Captain Curtis, and although our men did their best throughout the meet, they were beaten out by the men from Amherst, Dartmouth, Williams, and Brown, who took the first four places in the order mentioned.

The preliminary heats in the dashes, hurdles, shot-put, discus, and hammer-throw, took place on Friday, May 20, and the following Tech men qualified: Le B. Turner, E. P. Noyes, C. R. Haynes, H. L. Williams, W. M. Van Amringe, W. J. Knapp, W. B. Boggs. In addition to the above, the following men competed on Saturday: E. L. Wilson, M. A. Coe, R. D. Farrington, G. H. Chapman, G. D. W. Marcy, E. H. Lorenz, R. H. Burke.

Amherst took first place easily with $43\frac{1}{2}$ points. The contest for second, between Dartmouth and Williams, was very close, and was only decided by the last event, the pole vault. Hazen of Dartmouth succeeded in winning from Peabody of Williams, giving his college 28 points to $27\frac{1}{2}$ for Williams. Brown was fourth with 17 points, Tech fifth with $16\frac{1}{2}$. Bowdoin, Tufts, and Wesleyan followed with 13, 5, and $3\frac{2}{3}$ points, respectively.
