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The Technology Kommers.

The Technology Kommers are absolutely distinct Technology affairs. They are, moreover, entirely unique. At no other college in America can students gather in a building belonging to the college itself and enjoy such care-free, informal times as Tech men do on Saturday nights at the Union. Tech men suffer from a lack of opportunity to get together, and to learn each others ideas, and thus a large part of the pleasure and benefit usually derived from a four-years' course at an American college is lost to them. A comparatively small number at Technology have opportunities to meet their fellow-students. *Technique*, the Musical Clubs, the Fraternities, Athletics, Osiris, and to a small extent the Professional Societies, furnish limited means to a few, and the Kommers is maintained to enable the members of each of these branches of student activity to meet the members of every other branch — here the Track Team man may exchange opinions with the *Technique* man, the Musical Club man may talk with the Professional Society man, and the men of one Fraternity may become acquainted with the men of another.

One suggestion in regard to the Kommers has been heard by the Committee and we are informed

that it will be acted upon. The suggestion is to the effect that each class, beginning with the Seniors, take charge for one Saturday evening; that a member of that class preside, and that a committee of the class provide some "stunt" for the amusement of the gathering. To provide the best "stunt" would be the aim of each class, and some interesting class rivalry should result. The Seniors already have arranged their program, and it remains but to decide the date and to make the announcement.

The House Committee of the Tech Union urges the three lower class presidents to appoint their committees as soon as possible. No concerted class action is needed, and the committees will require but little time to prepare their programs.

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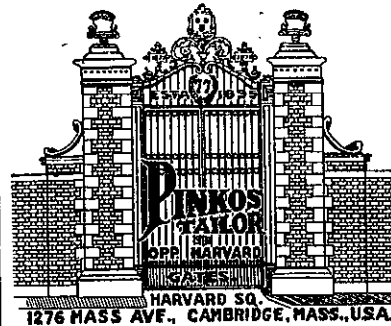
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
