CIVIL ENG. SOCIETY.

Excursion Through East Boston Tunnel.

In spite of the severity of the weather, more than two hundred men took advantage of the Society's trip of inspection through the new East Boston Tunnel on Saturday afternoon.

The party was divided into three sections, which were taken in charge by Messrs. E. S. Davis, H. S. McCurdy, and W. W. Davis, members of the Engineering Corps of the Boston Transit Commission, who pointed out many interesting features of the work, and distributed among the members of the party a number of plates showing a cross section of the river-bed and tunnel.

This excursion is to be followed by a supplementary lecture on the tunnel by one of the members of the Engineering Corps, further announcement of which will be made later.

REPUTATION ABROAD.

Technology's Reputation in Foreign Countries.

That the Alumni have made a name for their Alma Mater in Foreign Countries is indicated by the increase in the number of foreign students at Tech.

The fact that the number of students from foreign countries at the Institute of Technology has increased from year to year, is strongly indicative of her great and expansive reputation as a school of applied science. There are students here from countries very widely scattered over the world. Brazil, England, Scotland, Hawaii, Australia, South Africa, Mexico, Korea, China, and the Philippines, are the home lands of students now at the Institute. The Governments of the last two countries mentioned have recognized the growing reputation of the Institute of Technology, and have taken upon themselves the expense of educating their best young men here. In doing so, they signify their belief that it turns out the best technically trained men, judging from the character of the alumni. Technology deserves high praise for the character and ability of her alumni, who have done much to give her the reputation which she now holds among scientific schools, one of the best and second to none. The presence here of students from various foreign countries may be directly traced to the alumni, who have discovered to the world the efficient training they received here. Those students now here will in the future, have the privilege of making the world acquainted with the Institute of Technology, and thus prepare the way for more students to come here from all parts of the world for technical training.

BOARD PREFERS CHARGES.

Report of the Police Board Sent to Governor Bates.

Acting in accordance with the request made by Counsel Hill in his argument at the close of the Technology hearing, the Police Board has preferred charges against all the members of the department whom Mr. Hill declared to have been either negligent in their duty or to have violated the rules of the department on the night of the attack upon the students by the police.

The charges are made by the Board against the following: Capt. G. A. Hall, Lieut. Henry J. Watkins, Sergts. G. H. Guard, H. J. Ringer, R. Fitzgerald, T. F. Goode, F. Arnold, E. R. Taylor, J. E. Sanford, W. J. Sheehan, and D. F. Eagan.

The hearings will be begun before the Police Board next Wednesday, December 14, and will be conducted in the manner customary against police officers. It is expected that the cases will be taken up individually.

The report on the hearing was made to Governor Bates this morning by the Police Board. It contains no findings, as it has been the intention of the Commissioners to reserve anything of this nature until after the trials of the officers against whom they have preferred charges. The letter informs the Governor that the investigation has been finished, and names the officers against whom charges have been preferred. It concludes by stating that the trial of these officers shall be proceeded with immediately, and that as soon as it has been finished, a full report will be made to the Governor of all the facts and findings thereon.

Basket Ball.

The First Basket Ball Team played Mechanics Arts High at the Gym, Saturday afternoon. The game was for practice, and an accurate score was not kept.

The Second Team was defeated by Andover Saturday, 73-13. The Andover men played a fast game, which completely outclassed the loose work of Tech.
