For the Hockey Team to be beaten so decidedly by even the fast Harvard men, came as a great surprise to all of us. The Team has this year had advantages which previous hockey teams have not possessed. There are two possible reasons for the defeat, either the individual material for the formation of the Team has this year been poorer than usual, or the practice has not been conducted in a manner calculated to develop a good team from good players. Excursion to Iceland.

Professor Jaggar announces that there will be a geological excursion to Iceland during the coming summer, and that he will be glad to receive the names and addresses of any students of the Institute who would like to join the excursion, in order that he can furnish them with information as plans develop. Professor Jaggar will probably go ahead of the main party, who will join him at Reykjavik about July 2. The route is from Boston to Liverpool, thence to Leith in Scotland, from Leith by one of the Danish Steamers to Reykjavik. These steamers leave Leith once in ten days, the trip lasting four days. The object of the expedition is the study of the volcanoes, glaciers and geysers, which are among the most remarkable in the world. The total expense per man should not exceed \$250.

Suitably recommended students from other colleges may be admitted to the party, and may choose thesis topics in the Iceland field for investigation.



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
