Why should not Tech have as well organized cheering as the colleges with whom she competes in Track and other athletics? Any movement to obtain a new yell and to organize the cheer leading, should come through the Institute Committee. In order that results may be ripe for use in the Spring Meets, now is the time for action.

future location of the Institute has been for some time an open question, so much so that the last two buildings erected by the corporation have been temporary in character, and the Walker memorial is still unbuilt; although the money for that building was long ago subscribed. The entire question, of course, is affected by the fact that the legality of the permission given the Institute by the State Legislature to build over the entire area of its land on Boylston street, or to sell the same, is still before the courts, and also by the fact that the outcome of the negotiations with Harvard University is still more or less in doubt.

The Hockey game that was to have been played on Washington's Birthday at the Braeburn Country Club was canceled on account of the poor condition of the ice. The season is to be ended by a series of games for the class championships. The first game of the series is to be played this afternoon at 4.15 at the Tech Rink. 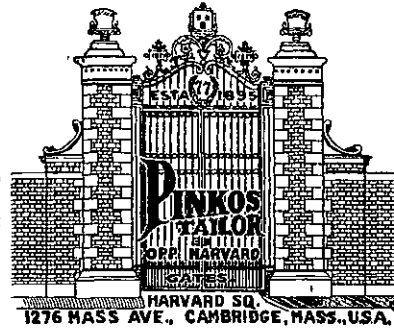
