HUNTINGTON HALL FRIEZE.

Seniors Have Voted to Restore Three Panels.

The Senior Class, at their dinner last Thursday evening, voted to raise money to restore part of the old Frieze that formerly adorned Huntington Hall, and to present it on Class Day. About two hundred and seventy dollars was subscribed in a very few minutes, so the restoration of the Frieze is assured. A committee of the class has been appointed to secure more subscriptions, and it is expected that three panels will be restored; the one directly over the platform, from which the present Tech seal is derived, and one larger panel on either side. For this purpose about four hundred dollars will be needed. The unveiling of the panels will be the feature of the Class Day exercises this year, as the presentation to President Pritchett of a loving cup was last year.

Civil Engineering Society.

There will be a meeting of the Civil Engineering Society, Thursday, March 9, at 4.15 p.m., in Room 11, Eng. B.

Mr. Kimball, who is the Chief Engineer for the Boston Elevated Railroad, will give an illustrated lecture on "Some Engineering Features of the Boston Elevated R. R. System." This meeting should be especially interesting to the third year men, and it is hoped that there will be a large attendance.
