Runkle, who was for many years President of Technology. Professor Runkle was a close personal friend of William Barton Rogers, and greatly assisted him in the furtherance of his plans for the founding of Technology. He served as Secretary under President Rogers and succeeded him in the Presidency. After his resignation Professor Runkle remained at the Institute in the mathematical department until his death in 1902.
