The great administrative difficulties of conducting the enterprise, are, nevertheless, recognized even in the plan itself, by the provision for the dissolution of the agreement. This introduces a factor of uncertainty as to the future of the Institute, for however strong the ratification, men and conditions change.

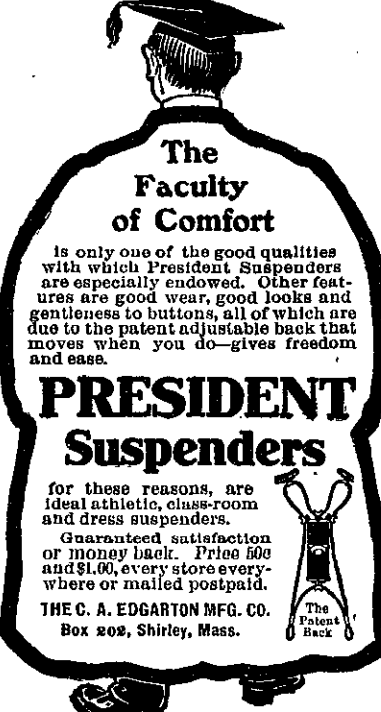
Should the agreement be voided by either party after several years, although its organization would be intact, the Institute would be left in possession of a site which would then be undesirable. In addition to this uncertainty there remains to be considered the loss of support from certain alumni and other opponents of the plan, and also the doubtful question of the possibility of successfully conducting the necessarily exacting courses of a scientific institution in the atmosphere of an academic college.

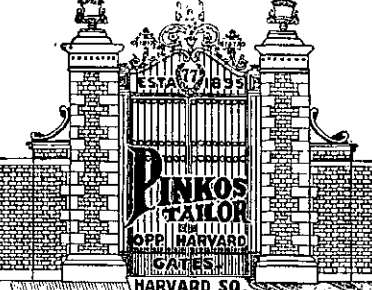
