We wish to congratulate those men who have joined together to form the British Empire Association, which, with fifty-seven British subjects at the Institute to-day, should develop into a strong and flourishing organization. This action shows a spirit of fellowship, especially characteristic of British subjects in a foreign land, which deserves much encouragement at Tech, where our outside activities are not apt to appeal to a foreigner. We wish the best of success in every respect to the new Association.

One of the main arguments in favor of the Technology-Harvard alliance, and a point which has been said to make the "Merger" a necessity, is that with the great resources furnished by the McKay endowment, it would be possible by offers of higher salaries, to obtain the best members of our instructing staff. The absence of such mercenary motives on the part of our Faculty is well illustrated by

the fact that of the funds recently subscribed to the Institute the amount given by members of the Faculty was greatly in excess of their proportionate share of the total. Instructors who have been at the Institute for a sufficient time to demonstrate their value are as loyal as the members of the Faculty itself.

It is earnestly to be hoped that the opinion of the Faculty, to whom the reputation and high standard of the Institute are due, will operate to prevent the adoption of an agreement which would eventually lower the standard of the Institute.
