The *Technique* 1906 forms are finally closed, and a number have already been printed.



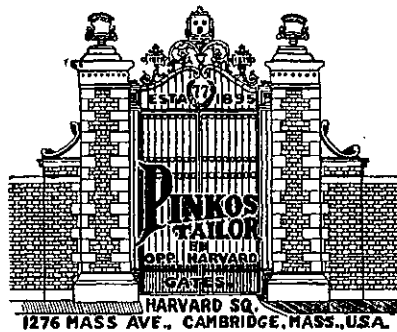
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
