BURSAR STARTS FUND.

Needy Students to be Assisted by Money Realized From Sale of Models of Rogers Building.

Bursar Rand will soon put on sale some plaster models of the Rogers Building. Mr. Rand is raising a fund to help needy students who are not eligible for a scholarship, and will use the profits from the sale of these models as the foundation of the fund.

The original model, which is the work of a second year Architect, was worked up in modeling clay from the plans in the possession of the Institute, the first floor plan and a perspective. Prof. Burton also had a photograph taken of the front of Rogers. The model was left in a sketchy condition to avoid the appearance of a penny-bank. It is about three and one-half inches long and two and one-quarter wide. Being on such a small scale it follows only the general lines of the building.

INTERCOLLEGIATE NEWS.

Yale Teams Disqualified by A. A. U. Big Track Meet at Philadelphia. Harvard Gets Bequests.

Invitations for the Intercollegiate and Interschool Track Meet to be held at Philadelphia April 29 have already brought forth many replies, which indicate that the meet will be the most successful ever held in the history of intercollegiate athletics.

The most important feature of the meet will be the presence of a number of relay teams and crack individual performers from the more important Western universities. This will be the first time in a number of years that the Western and Eastern college athletes have met in a general meet, and because of this fact the Pennsylvania Meet almost equals the intercollegiate championships in importance.

Chicago, Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota have all accepted invitations to send relay teams, and have also signified their intention of sending teams of individual stars to compete in this class of events. Chicago will bring on its starquarter-miler. Wisconsin and Minnesota will make an effort to land the one-and two-mile championships. Yale, Harvard, Cornell and Pennsylvania will all have teams in the one-mile relay to attempt to prove the superiority of the East, and nearly all the Eastern colleges of importance have relay teams entered in the different class and distance events. Most of them also have at least one star whom they will send down to try to take a share of the individual honors.

One of the features of the event will be the relay races between preparatory schools. These have been divided into three classes and from the number of entries already received there should be a large number of close contests.

Yale's swimming team and basketball team have had several misunderstandings with the authorities of the Amateur Athletic Union. Yale has engaged in matches with teams not formally registered, and said authorities have disqualified the Yale teams. On Yale's side no especial notice has been taken of the matter as yet, but such concessions as are necessary for an amicable settlement will probably be made.

Harvard University has just been bequeathed \$1,000,000 by William F. Milton, of Pittsfield and New York, and \$200,000 by James C. Carter of New York.

Cornell is to have a cricket team this year. There is a cricket club also at the University of Penn.
