ANNUAL OUT THURSDAY.

Technique 1908 Rush at Noon, Back of Art Museum.

The current volume of *Technique*, Volume XX, will be issued April 27, at 12 o'clock, in the lot back of the Art Museum. The first twenty-five books will have Dr. Pritchett's signature and will be numbered in gilt on the cover. The men getting numbers one to five inclusive will be refunded the price of their tickets.

The book has left the printer's hands and is now being bound. It has been found possible to add sixty more pages without making the book unwieldy. Fifteen of the twenty-four forms are in two-color work, a much larger proportion of color than has been used before. There will also be six three-color plates.

SHOW NEARLY COMPLETED.

The management announces that the house has been sold out for both Boston performances, and that all seats must be called for before Monday, April 24. Seats for the Malden performance should be ordered at once, as the indications are all for a crowded house on Saturday night.

The musical score will be ready on Thursday afternoon at the theatre, before the performance.

WHO WILL WIN?

An Exciting Contest Between the Classes Expected at Spring Meet. Recent Class Baseball Games.

The Annual Spring Meet will be held at Technology Field in Brookline, on Saturday afternoon, April 22, beginning at 2 o'clock. Great interest has been shown in the event this year and it promises to be the best inter-class track meet ever held at the Institute. A large number of men have been out every afternoon under Trainer Mahan, and some very fast races are expected.

At this time it is hard to pick the men who will do the best, but some idea may be gained by watching the daily practice. In the 100-yard dash the favorites at present are M. T. Lightner, '06, Williams '06, Richards, '07, and Todd, '08. In the 220 and 440-yard dashes good work is expected from Turiver, '05, Lightner, '06, Williams, '06, Howe, '06, Gould, '07, Thomas, '07, and Blackburn, '08. In the hurdles the Sophomores will probably fight it out amongst themselves, as Albro, Eaton and Noyes can all make good time. The two-mile race should be very good. Lorenz, '05, will have some worthy opponents in Howard, '06, Clapp, '06, and Calloway, '08.

Of course there are many more men who have not competed here at the Institute before who may be expected to show up well.

The Spring Meet will decide the Class Championship. The present standing of the Classes is: 1905, 20 points; 1906, 11 points; 1907, 30 points; 1908, 5 points. President Pritchett and members of Faculty are expected. Freshmen will march behind their band to the field. A score board will be erected on the field and the score will be kept as points are made.

Among those who will be invited to act as officials will be: Dean Burton as custodian of prizes, Bursar Rand as scorer, Professors Derr and Fey as timers, W. W. Coe, champion shot putter, Thatcher, '07, the inter-collegiate middle-weight wrestling champion, John DeWitte of Princeton, W. Jackson of Dartmouth, and several old Tech stars.

M. E. SOCIETY EXCURSION.
