Second, even should the first objection be insufficient, with the right men chosen, it would be very difficult in the latter part of the Freshman year to make such a wise choice.

Huntington, \$250,000 from Mr. David Sears. The endowment of the school consists of \$1,000,000 given by John D. Rockefeller and nearly a million from other sources. The new buildings will be ready for use in September, 1905.

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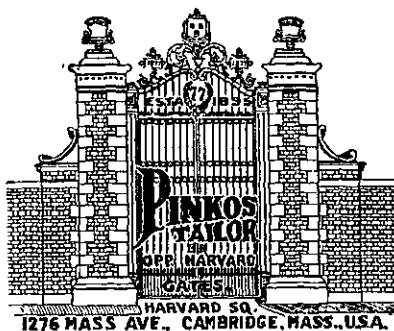
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
