places for the college, and in both mile and two miles we may perhaps expect a place, though the events will go easily to M. I. T. In the low hurdles, Amherst is very strong and should take all three places, with W. P. Hubbard and J. H. Hubbard, pushed by Hopkins and Conley. In the 120-yard hurdles, we should have first place, with J. H. Hubbard running faster than ever before. The broad jump will be another Amherst event

from start to finish. W. P. Hubbard and Read are jumping 22 ft., Morton nearly 21 and Johnson, who has been in poor form, about 20 ft. In the high jump Bishop ought to win some points, and Newton and Crook should do the same in the pole vault. In the weights Amherst will get more than her share of points, with Rollins doing excellent work in all three events and Diehl improving in throwing the discus."

In the pole vault Amherst has her weakest event. Cook who won the event in the spring games did only 10 ft. 6 in. and second place was taken at 9 ft. 6 in.
