TRACK TEAM DINNER.

Amherst Team Entertained at Tech Union.

Perhaps the most successful part of the meet with Amherst on Saturday was the dinner given by the M. I. T. A. A. to the Amherst Track Team at the Tech Union directly after the games. Both sides vied with each other in making this social gathering enjoyable, and when with an Amherst cheer and then a Tech one the dinner broke up, each man present appeared to have the most hearty good will toward everyone else.

As the Amherst men had to take the eight o'clock train the speeches were begun while the dinner was in progress. Capt. Lindsly acted as toastmaster and introduced first Dean Burton. After a short talk Prof. Burton presented the prizes won in the meet to the different men.

A Tech song was next sung and Coach Mahan then spoke, calling attention to the fact that this dinner was the first known occasion where two opposing teams had met at dinner after the contest.

Captain Rollins of the Amherst Team next spoke and thanked the Tech men for their kindness. He said that the Amherst men had the most kindly feeling for Tech and hoped that the Meet would be continued in future years.

Manager Van Etten next spoke, and supplemented Captain Rollins' remarks with a tribute to Tech's hospitality. The other speakers were Professor Woods and Professor Bailey, who both gave some pleasing anecdotes.

After the last speaker, the Stein Song was sung and then the Amherst team gave a cheer, followed by one by the Tech men, and every one started for the station to cheer the Amherst team off.

WORCESTER MEET.

Circulars are being carried around by several men interested in securing a large cheering section to support the Tech Track Team at the N. E. I. A. A. games at Worcester, Saturday, May 20. All men who have intentions of attending this Meet should sign their names to the paper in order that the Track Team management can make suitable arrangements to accommodate this support. The railroad fare will not exceed \$1.25 round trip, if over 100 men go this way, and the admission to the games is 50 cents. The train leaves at 12.08 p.m. Saturday.

AMHERST WINS DUAL MEET.

The Final Score: Amherst, 74 1-2; Tech, 65 1-2. Record in Hammer Throw Broken.

Tech was defeated by Amherst in the Dual Meet last Saturday by a score of 74½ to 65½. The events were closely contested and exciting throughout, so that the final outcome was uncertain until the last two events. A good crowd attended and cheered enthusiastically for the winners.

W. K. Knapp, '06, broke the Tech record in the Hammer Throw by one and three-quarter inches. For Amherst, W. P. Hubbard was the star, winning first place in the 220-yard Hurdles and Broad Jump, and tying for second in the High Jump. The honor for Tech was shared by R. D. Farrington, '05, and M. T. Lightner, '06, each scoring eight points.

In the middle distance runs, Amherst showed up well, the same man winning both the half-mile and mile runs, but in the two mile race both Amherst men dropped out after the sixth lap.

The meet was a little late in starting because of a misunderstanding as to the number of places counting points. Our opponents held that only the first three places should be counted, while the agreement signed by the two colleges stated that the meet should be governed by the N. E. I. A. A. rules, which count four places. The referee decided in favor of Tech, but our management, out of courtesy to the Amherst team, agreed that only the first three men should be point winners, provided third place be counted two points. This was satisfactory to both and ended the discussion.

The 100-yard Dash was closely contested, but Read, '08, of Amherst, was superior to the Tech men. Lightner of Tech ran hard, but was not able to win.

The mile race was run in the fast time of four minutes, thirty-eight and three-fifth seconds. It looked like Tech's race, as Buckingham, '06, and Chapman, '07, led for most of the way. On the last turn, H. E. White, '08, of Amherst, broke away with a fine sprint and won the race.

Tech got second and third places in the 120-yard Low Hurdles, J. H. Hubbard, '07, of Amherst, winning easily.

In the Shot Put, Rollins, '05, of Amherst, made forty-three feet, five inches on his first put, and this distance was not equalled during the rest of the event.

The 440-yard Run was a spirited race, with the field well bunched until the finish. Howe, '06, of Tech,

made a good sprint on the back stretch, but was unable to pass the Amherst men.

The High Jump was a slow and long drawn-out contest, Tech finally winning with seven and one-half points. W. P. Hubbard, '06, of Amherst, and H. A. Rapelye, '08, of Tech, tied for second place, the former winning the toss-up for the medal.

The 880-yard Run was a pretty race between H. E. White, '08, of Amherst, and E. L. Wilson, '06, of Tech, with the rest of the Tech entries fighting for third place. Wilson and White ran abreast until nearly to the tape when White forged ahead and won by a foot.

The Two-Mile Run was Tech's event. Callaway took the lead from the beginning and his time, ten minutes and twenty-five seconds, was good, considering that he was not pushed. The two Amherst entries were run off their feet and stopped on the sixth lap.

Of the ten men entered in the Hammer Throw, only five competed. Knapp had much the better of the event throughout and when the final throw was over he had broken his old record by one and three-quarter inches. Captain Lindsly did excellent work, winning second place. Third place was won by Rollins of Amherst.

The 220-Yard Dash proved by far the most closely contested event of the day. M. T. Lightner showed himself to be the star for Tech by winning the final a yard ahead of A. M. Stearns of Amherst.

The two trial heats in the 220-Yard Low Hurdles were run off in rather slow time, Amherst winning in each case, with the Tech entries fighting for second place. The final was run in very fast time and was a pretty fight between the Hubbards of Amherst for first place, with Noyes of Tech in third place.

The Pole Vault was a very long drawn-out contest with Crook, '07, of Amherst and Farrington, '05, of Tech working for first place. Crook finally won first place, Tech taking the other two places.

In the Broad Jump, Tech was particularly weak, not being able to win a place. W. P. Hubbard won by a jump of 21 feet 3 inches.

The last event was the Discus Throw, and it failed to rouse much enthusiasm as the outcome of the meet was already certain. Amherst succeeded in winning first and second places, with Tech third.
