SOPHOMORES WIN.

First Game of Championship Series Goes to 1907 by the Score of 4-2.

The Sophomores won the first game of the championship series with the Freshmen yesterday by a score of 4 to 2. INDUSTRIAL CHEMISTRY.

Professor Walker's Course in Industrial Chemistry was concluded by an excursion to the Merrimac Chemical Company, at South Wilmington, on Tuesday, May 16.

The manufacturing of Glauber's Salt from nitre cake was the object of particular interest, for previous to the excursion the class had experimented upon this process in the laboratory, and each member had drawn a plan of a plant which he considered would carry it out on a large scale.

FACULTY MAKES REPORT.

Action on Alliance Reported to Corporation Last Saturday, and to be Referred to Alumni Today.

The report of the Faculty on the educational advantages and disadvantages of the proposed plan for alliance with Harvard University, was made to the Corporation last Saturday.

The report has been referred to the Alumni by the Corporation, and it has been printed in pamphlet form by the Executive Committee of the Alumni Association. These pamphlets, which include the main resolution, seven appendices and a minority report, in all 77 pages, are to be sent to the Alumni today.

The vote of the Faculty by which the report was adopted on May 5, stood 56 to 7, and was as follows:

TECH NIGHT AT THE "POPS."

Application blanks are now being distributed to the undergraduates for tickets to Tech night at the "Pops." These should be sent in immediately. Those who have not already secured any application blanks may obtain them from their Class Secretary. Floor tickets at table will be \$1.00, and balcony tickets, 75 cents.

The whole of Symphony Hall has been reserved, the floor for past students and undergraduates, and the balconies for ladies and their escorts. Each class will be assigned a number of tables on the floor in ratio to the applications received.

Tickets in the balconies will be assigned strictly in order of receipt of requests with remittances.

There are less than 1,100 seats in the balconies, a number far inadequate to meet the demands made upon us last year.

In the expression of its opinion the Faculty has felt obliged to confine its attention to the plan as submitted, assuming that at least its main features are essential to the consummation of the agreement, and has not ventured to discuss the indefinite question of advantageous modifications.

The educational policy of the Institute, the advantages and disadvantages of the proposed plan, and the fact that the Institute is not a local, but a national institution, are discussed at length.

The report states that the success of the Institute has been and still is a success, namely of character and morale; and it is precisely these vital qualities which the Faculty believes would be destroyed by the changes called for under the terms of this agreement. For it is not merely proposed to remove the Institute to a new site, but to graft it upon another institution.

The report concludes by saying that by the alliance with Harvard much might be accomplished in harmonious effort, which should be highly beneficial to both the University and the Institute. This development, however, must be a growth. It cannot be forced, as the proposed agreement would attempt to force it, for it is in the nature of continuous experiment, presenting problems for the solution of which no data exists.
