TECH-HARVARD ALLIANCE

**To be Decided Before Commencement.
Whether or Not Tech Shall
Accept the Proposed
Agreement.**

The question for so many months undecided as to whether or not Tech should form an alliance with Harvard University, will be at last settled probably for good, so far as the consent of Tech is concerned, at the next meeting of the Corporation to be held just before Commencement. The Faculty have already expressed their opinion on the matter by the almost unanimous vote of 56 to 7 against the proposed agreement, and now it only requires the opinion of the Alumni before definite action will be taken by the Corporation. The mail ballot of all the Alumni will be taken the latter part of next week, after which it only remains for the Corporation to take the final action at the meeting to be held shortly before graduation, for the purpose of making out the diplomas. As the majority of the Executive Committee of the Corporation are strongly in favor of the Alliance, the final outcome at present seems rather uncertain. However, we may well feel assured that the Corporation will do only what is for Technology's very greatest good, and that they will consider above all else, the earnest and sincere opinions expressed by our Faculty and Alumni.

At this critical moment, when the whole future of Technology is at stake, and our Alumni, Faculty and Corporation are so deeply discussing and considering the question, it is only proper that the following general information concerning the proposed Agreement for Alliance and Co-operation with Harvard should be submitted to the students:

The term Industrial Science as used in the proposed agreement, is used to conform with the original publications of the Institute, and not to indicate a separation of instruction as between pure and applied science.

In the present Faculty of the Institute are 65 members. The maximum number which could be added from the Lawrence Scientific School is 16.

The proposed agreement provides that a graduate would receive the Institute degree and diploma exactly as at present. In addition he might receive the same degree, on the same Faculty recommendation, from Harvard University.

No provision is made for instruction in Harvard of students of the Institute in general studies, nor for instruction of Harvard students in the

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MISTAKE IN SENDING ENTRIES

Track Team Difficulty at Worcester.

Owing to a misunderstanding and mistake on the part of the Tech manager, Tech's entries for the N. E. I. A. A. Meet this Saturday, went astray and were not officially received or recognized. The entries went to F. H. Bigelow at Worcester, who is supervising the management of the games, whereas the proper person was the Secretary of the Association, Mr. Weeks of Wesleyan.

In the official list of entries published on Wednesday, Tech's entries were not included. Managers Simpson and Mann left for Worcester yesterday afternoon and held a conference with other official representatives. The date of Tech's letter of entry was shown. A telegram to THE TECH late last night, stated that no protest was made, and we will be in the meet.
