SUMMER SCHOOL OF TOPOGRAPHIC GEODETIC AND HYDRAULIC SURVEYING.

A party of between fifteen and twenty students and instructors of the Civil Engineering Department, composing the Summer School of Topographic, Geodetic and Hydraulic Surveying, will leave Boston the first week in June for East Machias, Me., where the school is to be held this year. Later in the month it is expected that Dean Burton will be able to be present and co-operate in the instruction and direction of the school.

The work will consist of an extension of the topographic survey

commenced two years ago, field practice in triangulation and baseline measurement, the gauging of the East Machias River and the determination of mean sea level by tidal observation.

The party will return to Boston July 1.

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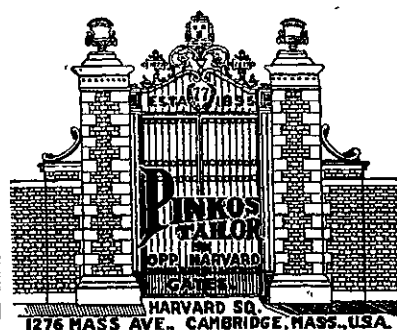


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
