WALTER CAMP FAVORS CHANGES.

Among the changes which will be considered by the intercollegiate football rules committee at its next meeting in Philadelphia, Walter Camp, the Yale athletic adviser, considers opening the play and lessening accidents and unnecessary roughness, as absolutely essential. He expresses the belief that the committee must answer the public demand for reform and that Yale, owing to her position, has a special responsibility in these reforms.

Mr. Camp states that the committee is practically agreed on measures tending to eliminate brutality and provide competent officials. He also suggests shortening the playing halves, a distance penalty for time taken out at the request of the captain, the ball be called dead when any part of the person of the runner, save his feet, touches the ground, more rigid definition of the use of hands and arms, and better protection for catching the ball.

PRINCETON-HARVARD DEBATE.
