Dear Sir, I read in THE TECH of December 11 a notice inviting the students of Technology to join the Massachusetts Corps of Coast Artillery. As a graduate of the Institute and as a member of the Corps I desire to heartily encourage all students and their friends who can possibly spare the time to enlist in this Military Organization for at least one period. Speaking from the experience of several years I feel that the military training received here is a distinct benefit.

In this Corps one takes up both artillery and infantry with the opportunities for small arms practice, the rifle and revolver, at the range during eight months of the year, and this in itself is a pleasant recreation and of great physical benefit to those leading sedentary lives, particularly students.

The week at Camp is devoted to gaining a practical working knowledge of artillery which lays the foundation for efficient service in case of hostilities. While there is of course considerable work attached to this service, yet there is also no little fun to be gotten out of it both at Camp and in the weekly drill. All break Camp reluctantly at the end of the tour and return home brown in color and better for their week's camp near the shore.
