MUSICAL CLUBS MAKE HIT.

The Winter Concert and Dance is an Exceptional Success.

The annual Winter Concert and Dance of the Musical Clubs, held Wednesday evening in the New Century Building, was by far the most successful and enjoyable the clubs have ever given. There were over six hundred people present at the concert and two hundred of these remained for the dance.

The matrons were Mrs. Peter Schwamb, Mrs. Harry E. Clifford, Mrs. Arthur G. Robbins, and Mrs. Frank P. McKibben.

The concert hall was decorated with flags furnished by A. H. Tashjian, '07, and the dance hall was strung with Japanese lanterns.

The program of the concert was a well selected one, and the clubs showed the hard practising they have been doing by the excellent manner in which they rendered their numbers.

The Banjo Club played a number of lively pieces, well adapted to their purpose. The Glee Club made a great hit with its songs, which were indeed well rendered. At the conclusion of the Glee Club's last number, "Tech Forever," R. E. Keyes, '07, leader of the Glee Club, called for a Technology cheer, and the "yell" that followed almost raised the roof.

The biggest hit of the evening was "A Bashful Bachelor," as played by the Mandolin Club. Soon after the selection was begun, one of the men stopped playing, looked at his watch, and, with a surprised expression on his face, ran off the stage. One by one the other men did the same, so that the stage was empty by the time the selection was finished.

The solos by W. B. Jenkins, '09, and A. H. Thompson, '08, were excellently rendered and added greatly to the enjoyment of the program.

The dance was very much enjoyed by those who attended it, although at the beginning the floor was somewhat crowded.

MEET GOES TO 1908.

Sophomores Easily Win the First Dual Indoor Class Meet.
Score: Sophomores 55½; Freshmen 42½.

The Sophomores won the Dual Meet last evening by a score of 55½ to 42½. The score is no indication of the hard-fought contests that took place. The Sophomores managed to win most of the events, but they wore themselves out so completely while doing it that the Freshmen took the relay race.

Steins stamped with the Technology seal will be given to the men who finished first and second, and class numerals to the men who finished first. The Sophomores will also be given a silken banner which will be hung in the Tech Union.

The audience was very small in numbers, but very large in enthusiasm. The cheering often did much to help the winners of events.

The relay race was the most exciting event of the evening. First one class was ahead and then the other, the same men often changing positions several times. Each man ran four laps.

The high jump, the first event of the meet, was started at a few minutes past eight. Four Freshmen and three Sophomores contested. Rapelye '08 and Dickerman '09 fought it out for first place, and Rapelye won at 5 ft. 4 in.

In the pole vault, Very '09, Orr '08, and Richardson '08 were contestants in the finals and the match was a close one. Richardson failed to clear at 9 ft. The bar was then raised 6 in. and at first trials both men failed by a narrow margin. The event was finally won by Orr '08 at 9 ft. 6 in. with Very '09 second and Richardson '08 third.

Four of the six men who ran in the 600-yard dash were Sophomores, but both the 1909 men won points for their class, one finishing second and the other third. Blackburn '08 lead at the first corner, with Godfrey '09 at his heels, and they kept the same order to the finish.

Only six of the men entered for the shot-put appeared for the event—four representing '09 and two '08. The event was very closely contested, there being only two inches between first and third place. The Sophomores captured both first and second honors.

Twelve men appeared at the mark for the 35-yard dash. Two Freshmen and two Sophomores were left in the final heat. Whittaker '09 easily won first, and Todd '08 won second place after a close race with Moses '09.

Two preliminary heats were run in the 35-yard hurdles. The first and second places in the final heat were taken by the Freshmen.

The 1000-yard run was the Sophomores' race from the start, although the two Freshmen who entered put up a plucky race. Allen, Clapp and Gimson followed each other closely,

until Gimson with a final spurt succeeded in passing them all, finishing first in 2 min. 44 sec.
