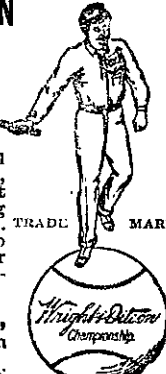

 Toastmaster Williams next called on a member of the class, William Furrer, who said he often lamented the predominance of the practical side of a Tech man's nature, but went on to show that at least humor is not wanting by calling forth universal merriment in reading selections from a witty sketch, entitled "The Log of the Water Wagon."
 Professor Sedgwick, who spoke next, began by expressing his wish to know better personally the members of the class. The student, he maintained, should, as far as possible, endeavor to get personally acquainted with his professors, so as to work hand in hand with them.
 The Seniors are the ones who have "lived through the war" and are about to go into active work and to represent Technology and all for which she stands. Technology graduates at the present day have great opportunities before them, and there is a great demand for the right men. No student need ever worry about his ultimate success as long as he keeps intact his health and character.
 Modesty and honesty are indispensable attributes, and are in great demand today especially, on account of the gigantic disclosures of graft which have lately shocked the country in connection with the insurance scandals. Technical men, he was glad to say, have practically never been accused of dishonesty.

At one time the distinction was not drawn, and still is not in some sections, between a tradesman and a professional man. The difference, however, is great. The latter goes farther than the former; he understands the principles and theory of his work and is actuated not merely by monetary considerations but by the love of his vocation. Although Tech graduates are of necessity at first rather narrow, they thereby have a better chance of success in their professions, and later have plenty of chance for producing and becoming cultured citizens.
 On behalf of the Portfolio committee S. C. Coey then spoke a few words about the necessity for haste in finishing with the photographer, as the matter is this year unusually late. The Class Day elections were then read by President Coe; and H. C. Henrici, the First Marshal-elect, responded to the popular clamor by acknowledging in a short speech the honor which his classmates had conferred upon him. The gathering broke up after a cheer.
