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CATHOLICS FORM CLUB.

Thirty-eight Technology men of the Roman Catholic religion met at the Tech Union last evening to consider the advisability of forming a Catholic organization similar to the Catholic Clubs at other colleges. Theodore Dissel, '06, was appointed temporary chairman, and Allan Pope, '07, temporary secretary. The speakers were Father Farrell, Spiritual Director of the St. Paul's Catholic Club of Harvard, Wm. T. Mooney, Vice-president of that club, and Prof. Porter.

The meeting decided to take the steps to form an organization, and the chairman was instructed to appoint a committee of five to draw up

a Constitution and By-Laws, the chairman to be one of the members.

The purposes of the organization as stated by Father Farrell were first, to bring the Catholic students together; second, to promote the interests of the Catholic religion; third, to have the Catholic religion better known among the non-Catholic students; and, finally, to cultivate good-will between Catholics and non-Catholics.

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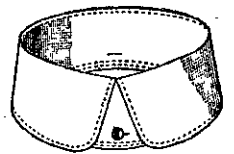
