## CLASS GAMES TONIGHT.

Seniors and Sophomores Win Preliminary Trials in Relay. Entry List Open Till 8 P.M.

The Annual Indoor Interclass Championship meet to be held tonight in the gymnasium promises to be a successful and exciting set of games. Much interest has been shown and about seventy-five men have already entered for the various events.

The trial heats in the relay race were run at the gymnasium Tuesday afternoon at five o'clock, the result of which was the elimination of the junior and freshman teams. Both the preliminary races were hard-fought contests, that between '08 and '09 especially. In the '06-'07 trial, although '06 got the lead at the start and was never headed, yet the race was a race throughout and was won by a narrow margin. The time was 4 min. 11½ sec.

The '08-'09 preliminary was spectacular and roused the enthusiasm of the spectators to a high pitch. Godfrey, the first freshman to run, gained about three yards for his class, but fell at the finish. His teammate stopped long enough to allow '08 to get a lead of fifteen yards, and then took up the race. When Moses, the last runner for '09, started, the lead had been cut down to ten yards. From the start he began to gain, and the rafters rang with cheers and shouts of encouragement. The lead was too great, however, and Moses finished two yards behind. The time was 4 min. 8 sec.

Each class expects to have a special cheering section tonight.

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## APPROVES TECH'S ADMISSION

Cornell Daily Sun Speaks Editorially — Deplores Break in League as Harmful to Fencing.

The recent separation in the Intercollegiate Fencing Association is not approved of by the *Cornell Daily Sun*. The *Sun's* position is that, whereas the attitude of the colleges which wished to shut out Technology was wholly wrong, nevertheless the Cornell delegate was not right in joining forces with Harvard and Columbia as he did, without consulting the college itself, and that much harm will result from the break in the Fencing Association.

The editorial of the *Sun* upon this reads as follows: "Intercollegiate fencers have disagreed and Cornell, joining together with Harvard and Columbia, has withdrawn from the Association. The disruption occurred over the application for membership of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. It was argued by the opposition that the Institute of Technology was not a university but rather a purely technical school and should therefore not be allowed to be represented in Intercollegiate Fencing. This same argument, if agreed to in other branches of athletics, would exclude the M. I. T. from all intercollegiate contests. Such discrimination is but a threat upon the principle of intercollegiate relations in general. The Institute of Technology is admittedly a college, eligible to other intercollegiate contests. Her eligibility to the Fencing Association was considered by three of the constituent colleges as not having been proven.

"The disunion of the Association is, however, most unfortunate. A branch of sport which in this country was none too strong before the trouble arose has now been most seriously weakened. Interest in fencing has for years been increasing slowly. The Intercollegiate Association had barely gained a respectable standing by the side of other athletic organizations. Its dissolution will greatly retard the development of fencing as a sport in American colleges."

## FENCING DATES FIXED.

Despite the break in the Intercollegiate Fencing Association, the matches to be held this winter promise to be quite decisive, owing to the number of special meets that have been arranged in addition to the schedules of the two separate leagues.

Meets have been arranged as mentioned below, and several others probably will be arranged by the fencing team management. On February 9 a dual meet is to take place between Tech and Harvard. On Feb. 16 a three-cornered meet has been arranged with Tech, Harvard, and Columbia as participants. These will be held in Boston.

## Y. M. C. A. IS ACTIVE.

Will Send Delegates to Nashville in February — Weekly Meetings Recommence February 8.

This year the Christian Association, reorganized, has enlarged considerably upon the scope of activities of previous years and is making itself felt by influential work.

The employment bureau established in the early part of the year, has succeeded in obtaining positions for a number of men. And as a directory of boarding places, the Y. M. C. A. office has proved of considerable service.

According to present plans, a delegation of some size will be sent to the Student Volunteer Convention to be held at Nashville, Tenn., from February 28 to March 4. This convention may be called the Mecca of those interested in college Y. M. C. A. work. Those in attendance represent every part of the world. All the larger American universities yearly send strong delegations; Harvard, for example, 41 men, Yale 33. This is to be the fifth of these conventions.

The Institute Association has sent out a number of speakers to Y. M. C. A.'s and churches of towns around eastern Massachusetts. During the month of December, Tech had charge of the meetings of the Y. M. C. A. of Lynn, as Harvard had had during the month previous. Mr. Gates, the secretary, has spoken at Wakefield and at Brookline, and a deputation of four went one evening to Southville, Mass., two speakers and two musicians. This deputation work is to continue throughout the year, and offers opportunity for any who may wish to speak on religious or scientific topics or to entertain.

Bible study classes are to be continued during the second term and new ones are to be formed, if possible among small groups of congenial men.

Work on the new handbook will be begun during the two weeks following examinations.

The original announcement that a meeting would be held Thursday, January 11, has been changed, inasmuch as it seemed better to postpone further meetings till next month. On February 8, therefore, the next regular meeting will be held; announcement of the speaker will be given out later.

## NO QUORUM PRESENT.

The election of a 1909 Baseball Manager was postponed on account of the smallness of the attendance, at a Freshman Class meeting held on Monday at 1 P.M. H. E. Whitaker, Manager of the 1909 Track Team, offered his resignation, but in accordance with the general wish of the class consented to continue his official duties.

## INSTRUCTORS HEAR OF INDIAN CHARACTERISTICS.

At the Instructors' Club dinner held last evening at the Tech Union, the speaker was Mr. W. L. Underwood, lecturer on Biology at the Institute. The subject was: "In the Woods with an Indian." The talk was an analytical study of the peculiarities developed in the individual by reason of his environment. It dealt not only with the superiority of the Indian in matters pertaining to woodcraft, but told of the more than ordinary inability of the Indian to remember his whereabouts in the noises and confusion of the city. The entire talk was interesting and gave evidence of the speaker's keenness of observation.
