SOPHOMORES WIN.

1908 Fencers Beat Tufts at the Gym.
Score 7 to 2.

The Sophomore Fencing Team walked over Tufts College at the Gym Wednesday evening, winning seven out of nine bouts. L. D. Nix, of the Sophomores, was unable to participate in the meet, and the Tufts men, in a very sportsmanlike manner, allowed Jorge Lage, '06, to substitute in his place.

Lage and Bounetheau both won all their bouts in very easy form. Bounetheau did especially good fencing, and should make the empty place on the 'varsity team.

Wilkinson, '08, had not touched a foil for eight weeks, but managed to win his first bout after an extra two-minute bout. Through a misunderstanding of the rules he lost his other two bouts.

Gantaum was Tufts' best man. He won one bout from Wilkinson, and made Lage and Bounetheau hustle to win. Alvarengo, who is considered to be the best fencer at Tufts, did not show his usual form and lost all his bouts.

PLANT TEST AT LOWEL.

A plant test at Lowell by thesis men will start Friday night and last until Sunday night. Assistants are wanted as early as possible Saturday morning. THE B. A. A. MEET.

Tech has Relay with Bowdoin. Tickets for Meet are Scarce.

The present outlook for the seventh annual indoor handicap meet of the B. A. A. at the Mechanics Building, next Saturday evening gives promise of much interest. Already the various colleges have been busy fitting out their representative teams and there is every indication that many records attained at previous meets will be broken. Of particular interest is the 390 yard relay race between Technology and Bowdoin College. Each school has entered four men. Those comprising the Technology relay team are: Williams, '07; Howland, '08; Todd, '08; Blackburn, '08; Moses, '09; Godfrey, '09.

From these six men the four runners will be picked. It is hoped that the Tech team this year will succeed in winning a decisive victory in the relay race. The handicap events, however, offer very little probability of winnings on the part of the Tech contestants. One of the serious drawbacks in the way of support is the scarcity of tickets for the games.

PROF. JOHNSON LECTURES.

"The Causes and Effects of River Capture" was the subject of Prof. D. W. Johnson's lecture before the Society of Arts, Thursday evening. He concerned himself first with the general features of stream development, tracing the adjustment of water courses to the varied conditions to which they are subject after reaching the period of maturity. Then followed a statement of the reality of river capture and of the process through which it is effected as shown by a typical example.

The obvious effects of river capture were enumerated, and in conclusion Prof. Johnson emphasized these by referring to actual cases, the capture of the Tennessee near Chattanooga and of the Chattahoochee by the Savanna. About twenty-four stereopticon views were thrown upon the screen as illustrations.

Prof. Johnson has spent two summers in the Appalachian Mountains investigating the subject. His lecture was based, in part, upon this personal investigation.
