FENCING MEET TONIGHT.

Tech fences Columbia and Harvard at the Gym.

The varsity fencing team will have its first tournament this evening at the gymnasium when it meets Harvard and Columbia in the annual triangular meet. The meet promises to be as close and exciting as was last years, which Technology won only by hard work.

Columbia and Harvard have almost the same teams again this year, and are very strong. Tech has lost S. M. Henry, who graduated last June, and whose loss would be keenly felt if it were not that there is a good man to fill his place.

Jorge Lage, '06, and R. D. Gatewood, G., are still with the team and in fine condition. Lage took part in the Sophomore-Tufts meet on Feb. 7, and won all his events handily. He showed himself to be in his usual form and should defeat all his opponents this evening.

Gatewood although a graduate of Annapolis, is quite put out at the refusal of Annapolis and West Point to elect Tech to membership in the Intercollegiate Fencing Association, and will do his best to put Tech at the head of college fencers. He is a steady, consistent fighter and it takes a good man to win from him.

Harold Bounetheau, '08, is the man who is to fill Henry's place. Bounetheau was captain of last year's Freshman team, and in the meets with Springfield High School and Tufts College won all his bouts with great ease, showing himself to be a good fencer. In the sophomore meet with Tufts on February 7, he again defeated all his opponents.

Bounetheau has been working hard, is a hard fighter and a good fencer and, although this is the first time he has gone up against strong college fencers, he should make a good showing.

Harvard is stronger this year than ever before. Arthur Tyng, captain, and William MacLeod are back again, and W. L. Bowman, who was ineligible for the Harvard varsity team last year, has strengthened the team wonderfully. Tyng has fenced on the team for the past two years, and was a substitute the year preceding. He is vice-president of the University Fencing League. This is MacLeod's third year on the varsity.

Bowman, now in the Harvard Law School, fenced for three years on the Cornell team, of which he was captain in his senior year. He has been of the B. A. A. team for the past two years. In 1903 he won the Junior Foils Championship at the N. Y. A. C. In 1903-4 he won the championship of the Pennsylvania division, and at present holds the title of New England Champion.

The substitute is Herbert A. Hirsh, who fenced for Harvard on the team last year in the triangular meet between Tech, Harvard and Cornell.

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ACCOUNTS SHOW DEFICIT.

Freshman Class Meeting Held to Discuss Finance and Kommers.

PRIZES ESTABLISHED.

Cash for Three Best Articles on Pan-American Subjects.

Three prizes—a first prize of \$100, a second prize of \$75 and a third prize of \$50—have been established by the Hon. John Barrett, United States Minister to Columbia, to be awarded to the authors of the best papers on any one of the subjects named below. Mr. Barrett states the object of the prizes to be "to promote the study of history, peoples, politics, resources and possibilities of our sister Republics," and to develop throughout the United States "a wider interest in our political and commercial relations with Latin-America, and to foster a more general study of Latin-American history, institutions, political, social and educational conditions, material and industrial resources, and commercial possibilities—especially as they affect the growth of closer ties of international comity and confidence."

1. The competition is open to any student, man or woman, registered during the academic year 1905-6 in any American college, university or technical school. Undergraduate, professional and graduate students are alike eligible.

2. Papers submitted by competitors must not exceed 10,000 words.

3. Papers accompanied by the full name and address of the writer and statement of the class and college, university, or technical school to which the writer belongs, must be mailed or delivered to an express company not later than Sept. 1, 1906, addressed to the President of Columbia University, New York, N. Y., marked "For the John Barrett Prize."

4. The prizes will be awarded by a committee of Judges chosen for the purpose, and the results will be announced through the public press as soon after Oct. 1, 1906, as practicable.

5. The paper awarded the first prize will be transmitted by the undersigned to the Director of the Bureau of American Republics.

6. All papers submitted in competition, other than the one to which the first prize is awarded, will be destroyed as soon as the prizes have been awarded, unless, at the time of sending, a competitor asks for the return of the manuscript and furnishes a fully stamped and properly addressed envelope.

7. Papers must be submitted in typewritten form.

Any one of the following subjects may be chosen:

I. POLITICAL AND ECONOMIC.

a. The Monroe Doctrine and its influence on the political and economic development of Latin-America.

b. The influence of the Panama Canal on the commercial and political development of Latin-America.

c. Present conditions and future
