FIRST KOMMERS SUCCESS.

Fifty Men Present. Mr. Rand Outlines Plans for Future.

Exactly fifty men attended the Kommerz Saturday evening and had a most enjoyable time. Gov. Curtis Guild was expected to be present, but was prevented by his official duties. H. V. O. Coes, '06, of the House Committee, acted as toastmaster.

The meal served was an excellent one, and every man had all he wanted. Mr. Rand said that it was the intention to give as good a meal as it was possible to give, whether or not the Union lost or made money.

Mr. Rand told a few excellent stories, and in outlining the plans for future Kommerz announced that he hoped to secure the following men to talk on various evenings: Pres. Burrage, of the Eliot National Bank, on "Banking"; Lyman Underwood, who will give an illustrated lecture on "Life in the Maine Woods"; Gen. Bancroft, of the Boston Elevated Co., on "The Elevated System"; illustrated; Samuel Elder, the best after-dinner speaker in New England; Maj. C. S. Proctor; and, of course, Gov. Guild. Mr. Rand has other prominent men in view, whose talks will make up a set of interesting Kommerz.

HARVARD MEN ENTERTAINED.

The Architectural Society held a smoker at the Union Friday evening. In response to an invitation from the Society, some thirty-five or forty men of the Architectural Department, and of the "Pen and Brush Club" of Harvard attended. Quite a number of Technology graduates also were present.

Prof. D. Despradelle, the speaker of the evening, described the masterly and artistic way in which Paris has been laid out as a result of collaboration between architects, engineers, sculptors, and painters. Paris is the most beautiful and artistic city in the world. Only recently have Americans begun to beautify their cities, and a great field of useful work is open to the future architect.

Whatever may be the feeling between the average Harvard and the average Tech man, it must be said that nothing but a feeling of the best of good fellowship exists between the students of the Architectural Departments of the two schools. This is the spirit which makes the profession of Architecture the cleanest profession in the land. Harvard songs and Tech songs, Harvard cheers and Tech cheers, together with popular songs and student stunts vied with each other for first place. All around, the meeting was the best example of a display of friendly feeling ever seen between students of these two great rival schools and should result in much good.

HARVARD WINS 12 BOUTS.

Columbia Second with 8, Tech Last with 7.

Harvard won the triangular fencing meet from Columbia and Tech Friday evening at the gym. The score was Harvard 12, Columbia 8, Technology 7. Bowman, Harvard, and J. Lage, Tech, were the stars of the evening, each winning five out of their six bouts. Technology's comparatively poor showing was a great surprise to everyone.

The big bout of the evening was between Jorge Lage of Technology and W. L. Bowman of Harvard. Lage had not lost a bout for two years up to last evening, while Bowman is the champion of New England and a member of the B. A. A. team. The bout was close, but the judges, without any hesitation, declared Lage winner.

Columbia made an excellent showing, and lost only because the Harvard men were the better fencers. The bout between Frederico Lage of Columbia and Jorge Lage of Tech, brothers, was an interesting one, but the Tech man easily won.

Captain Tyng of Harvard won four of his bouts, although troubled all evening with a cramp in his left leg. MacLeod won three bouts and helped to boost up the Harvard score.
