THE INHERITANCE OF PROPERTY.

In an address before the labor Lyceum of Schenectady, John L. March, professor of modern languages at Union College, said that a man's estate should pass at his death into the control of the State and be sold immediately after for the benefit of the widow, leaving the children unprovided for, thereby giving the country the minds of many rich men's sons, who because they inherit wealth do not apply themselves to business. Professor March's address was on "The Inheritance of Property." He spoke of the Astors, Vanderbilts, Rockefellers and other rich families to prove that if rich men's sons were put under the lash of necessity the world would be benefitted.

BOWDOIN GETS \$50,000.

As a sequel to the dinner of the Bowdoin College alumni held in Washington January 24, Col. I. H. Wing, a retired lumberman of Wisconsin, has given \$50,000 to endow a college of mathematics at Bowdoin. Col. Wing, who is a native of Augusta, Me., was graduated from Bowdoin in 1856.

NASHVILLE CONFERENCE.

Technology's Delegation to the Conference
Left Boston Monday Night.

A delegation of members of the Technology Christian Association, consisting of the College Secretary, Mr. Don S. Gates, F. O. Adams, '07, L. Brook, '07, T. C. Keeling, '07, and A. Blake, '09, left Boston last Monday evening for the Nashville Student Volunteer Conference. This is the Fifth International Convention of the Student Volunteer Movement and will be attended by over three thousand students from all over the world. The delegation will arrive in Nashville this morning and will remain until Sunday night. The first meeting of the Convention will be held this afternoon. This meeting will be under the joint leadership of Mr. John H. Mott and Mr. Robert E. Speer.

The leading features of the Convention will include, beside addresses by the strongest speakers on Christian work, an impressive exhibit bearing on the progress of Christianity in the world and an exceptional opportunity for intercollegiate and interdenominational fellowship.

ENGLISH ACCEPT CHESS CHALLENGE.

A cable dispatch announcing the acceptance by Oxford and Cambridge of the challenge issued two weeks ago by the Tricollage Chess League for a match by cable was received by the Chess Club of the University of Pennsylvania Jan. 16. The match will be for the possession of the Isaac L. Rice International Trophy with a representative sextet selected from the players of Brown, Cornell and Pennsylvania.

Arrangements have been made by the colleges whereby the use of a cable can be had on two successive Saturdays, March 24 and 31, and the challenge was issued with this provision. Early in March the league committee will make its selection of the six players who will play against the Englishmen.

PROF. SWAIN'S READINGS.

Professor Swain, at his last reading, on Wednesday, February 14, read from one of Le Baron R. Briggs' essays on "Ideals," and also Elbert Hubbard's "A Message to Garcia." Professor Cross gave last night his fifth lecture in the course of eight lectures given by the Lowell Institute, on the "Recent Developments in Electricity." In this lecture he continued his discourse on wireless or sythetic telegraphy. Long distance transmission was considered at length, Trans-Atlantic transmission was dealt with, both in regard to the apparatus and results. The next lecture in the course will be held in Huntington Hall Saturday evening, March 3. In this lecture the subject of Radio-activity will be discussed.
