TO THE EDITORS OF THE TECH:

Dear Sirs, I wish to give a comparative statement of the support the classes are giving to the Junior Prom this year. The 110 names subscribed are distributed as follows: 89 Juniors, 12 Seniors and 9 Sophomores. The 204 men who attended last year were classed as follows: 103 Juniors, 56 Seniors, 38 Sophomores and 7 Freshmen.

From a most casual glance at the above it is apparent that the Senior and Sophomore Classes are not giving the Prom the support it deserves. For this is one of the things at Tech that compares most favorably with that of any of the colleges. '06 is in duty bound to support the Prom this year, for only with the aid of '05 could they have set the standard of Tech's Prom as high as it is now. The Senior Class is now the largest in school and the example they set for the lower classes of selfish indifference is enough to bring to life the almost forgotten expression of "A Tech man's lack of interest."

The extreme caution with which the Sophomores sign up can only be assigned to bashfulness. It is very important that we know how many guests to expect within a week as the contracts will be let by that time. The great improvement made in the Prom last year over that of the year before was but the expression of a desire on the part of the student body for one big social affair in the year. It would be hard to promise

many improvements over last year's Prom, but this we know, that this year's Prom will be at least as good, but only with as good support.
