DARTMOUTH WINS.

The Last Game of the Season Goes to Visitors. Score 58 to 18.

In a brilliant game before full benches, Dartmouth outplayed Tech last night. The score, however, is creditable to Tech, for Williams failed to score, and Yale was beaten recently by the Hanover five.

Team work was the strong element in Dartmouth's game, and Tech's playing could not meet it.

The game started off with a rush and for the first half was an exhibition game for Dartmouth. Tech was passed about the floor at the visitors' pleasure, and against the husky Dartmouth men seemed to stand small show. But in spite of this the home team rallied enough to score three times on fouls. Burleigh made some good tries but failed to fill the ring. Kinnear played well for Tech. On the Dartmouth side Grebenstein, McGrail, and Russ were the stars. Grebenstein made five goals from the floor and three on fouls.

In the second half Blankard went in and aided Dartmouth materially.

The Dartmouth team was well supported by a benchful of rooters, who assisted enthusiastically. The banjo club was present and added much to the pleasure of the games.

PROFESSOR GILL'S ADDRESS.

The Mechanical Engineering Society met at the Union Wednesday evening at 8 p.m. to hear Professor Gill speak on "Lubricants." About thirty-five members were present. Professor Gill showed a number of samples of various lubricants and described the processes used in their manufacture and refining. He also spoke of the uses and applications of lubricants. After the talk, refreshments were served and the evening ended with songs and music.

1907 DINNER.

The Juniors Have an Enthusiastic Time at the Union.

Good-fellowship was the spirit of the occasion Thursday evening when 1907 held its sixth semi-annual class dinner at the Union. About one hundred men were in attendance and an excellent dinner, good speakers, stories, and songs made the occasion surpass all former gatherings of '07. Those seated at the speaker's table were toastmaster Alexander Macomber, Prof. Dewey, Packard, '07, Bursar Rand, Leavell, '07, Prof. Allen, and the committee in charge.

Professor Dewey, the first speaker of the evening, talked in a humorous vein and created much comment by his "Advice of a student to the Faculty."

Bursar Rand said that he felt that he should not be compelled to furnish entertainment as well as the report. He spoke of the benefits of the Union as a place to congregate, and told everyone to feel welcome there. Professor Allen emphasized the fact that thoroughness has made the Tech education what it is today.

PROMINENT INVENTOR TO SPEAK.

Mr. E. G. Acheson, who is to speak at the Tech Union this evening, has distinguished himself in industrial science.

He was born in Washington, Pa., in 1856, educated at Bellefonte Academy, entered his father's sand blast furnace and later studied chemistry and electricity. In 1881 he was in Thos. A. Edison's laboratory, and in 1883 Assistant Engineer of Edison's work in Europe. In 1891 he discovered the silicide of carbon called "carborundum," and formed the Carborundum Company. In 1895 he obtained patents for the production of graphite in the electric furnace. He is a member of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, the Franklin Institute of Pennsylvania, and other scientific societies.

Mr. Acheson is in a position to give a most interesting lecture, and is not restricted by his subject, which is, "Invention and Discovery."

The Mining Society extends its invitation to all men who are interested in the subject to be present at 7.30 sharp this evening.

PRIZE DRILL PLANS.

A meeting of the Freshman Battalion was held in the South Armory Wednesday afternoon to discuss the Annual Prize Drill. It was decided that it would be preferable to hold the Interscholastic Competitive Drill and the Prize Drill of the Battalion on different days, and the following committee was elected to take charge of all arrangements: King, R. H. Allen, Miller, Dickerman, Jackson, Whittaker, and Hodson. An overwhelming majority then voted to have the Battalion Prize Drill on Friday evening, May 25. There will be no drill on the last Wednesday of the term.

At the close of the drill a meeting of the Committee on Arrangements was held in the officers' room, and Hodson, Adjutant of the Battalion, was elected Secretary and Dickerman Treasurer. The date of the Interscholastic Drill was set for Wednesday, May 2, and the conditions and movements of the competition were arranged. Provision was made for the appointment of a sub-committee to send circulars to all New England schools eligible to the competition, and the meeting adjourned to March 14.
