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PREXY TALKS AT KOMMERS.

Announces Possible Purchase of Site for Walker Memorial Building.

President Pritchett said Saturday evening at the Kommers that the Corporation was considering the purchase of the large plot of empty ground between Berkeley and Clarendon Streets, opposite Lowell, as a site for the Walker Memorial Building. Dr. Pritchett does not believe that the gymnasium will be included in the main building, as a gym would destroy the main function of the building, that of being a student club house. The gym will probably be built back of the Walker Memorial Building, so that it will not be a concrete part of the new building.

Eighty men attended the Kommers and were greatly entertained by Dr. Pritchett's remarks. G. M. Henderson, '06, presided and acted as toastmaster.

Dr. Pritchett expressed his regret at leaving the Institute, and gave an informal history of the beginning of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Learning. He then announced the possible purchase of a site for the Memorial Building, and went on to call attention to the real purpose of the Kommers.

"Kommers" is the German word for business, and its present meaning originated with the Hanseatic League of the Middle Ages, when the business men got together and discussed business affairs over their pipes and steins. So today, the Kommers is a gathering together for social entertainment with some purpose. The purpose may be to hear a speech, or to listen to some entertainment, but it must be accompanied by social intercourse. Each man should endeavor to entertain the man next him, and the real benefit of the Kommers comes from this social intercourse.

I. C. A. A. A. MEETS.

Intercollegiate Games will be Played on Soldiers Field May 25 and 26.

The Intercollegiate Amateur Athletic Association of America held its thirty-first annual convention at the Fifth Avenue Hotel, New York.

The most important action was the decision to hold the annual championship meet at Soldiers Field, on May 25 and 26. On the recommendation of the executive committee it was decided to accept the applications of Brown and Dartmouth for re-admission to membership in the Association. An application was also received from Dickinson, but as no one was present in behalf of the College, the application was laid on the table. The University of Michigan and Rutgers College were each declared dropped from membership in the Association for not having had an entry of three men in the last two championship meetings.

The contribution of \$500 to the Olympic games fund was ratified, as well as the appropriation of \$500 for a die of the new championship medal to be awarded at the 1906 field meeting.

On the recommendation of the executive committee, it was resolved "that records of Arthur F. Duffy are no longer acceptable to this association, and that the list of intercollegiate and of collegiate records be amended so that there be no mention therein of the name or performances of said Arthur F. Duffy."

The record of 11 feet 9½ inches for pole vaulting by W. R. Dray of Yale, and the record of 1 minute 56 seconds for the half mile by E. B. Parsons, Yale, were accepted as intercollegiate records, and these two athletes will receive record medals at the expense of the association.

A change was made in Article IV of the by-laws, so that the article now reads as follows: "No college shall enter more than twelve men for any one competition or shall start more than five."

An amendment to Article VII of the by-laws was also adopted, providing for the distribution of dividends, under certain conditions, to the colleges in proportion to the number of their competitors in the field meetings and the number of miles travelled from the locations of the colleges.

U. S. OFFICE FOR INSTRUCTOR.

Mr. A. G. Woodman, instructor in Sanitary Chemistry at the Institute, has been appointed chemist to the Food Inspection Laboratory, which the United States Government now maintains in connection with the Custom House. Since the beginning of the year Mr. Woodman has devoted a portion of his time to the problems connected with the examination of imported food materials.

LAWRENCE SCIENTIFIC.

The Harvard Corporation Vote to Establish a Graduate Engineering School.

Upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences the Corporation of Harvard University have voted to establish at the beginning of the next academic year a graduate school of applied science and to merge the Lawrence Scientific School with the academic department. In the graduate school degrees similar to that of M. E. will be conferred in the different branches of engineering, architecture, and forestry. A degree in arts or sciences will be required for admission. It is intended that the course will be two years, provided a student has arranged his work in his college course with a view of taking an advanced degree in the graduate school. Thus two degrees may be obtained in five years, which is one to two years shorter than the time required under the present plan to obtain a degree from the Law or Medical School or from a Technical School. This action by the Corporation will place the degrees of the new Harvard Scientific School on a par with the degrees given in the other professional schools. The plan further provides for the establishment of the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Harvard College, the requirements for which will be nearly the same as to the number of courses studied, as the requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts. The men studying for the Degree of Bachelor of Science may elect their subjects just as the men studying for the Arts degree, but the candidates for the new degrees will be expected to arrange their work in accordance with the plans of the department in which they work.
