Electoral Committee Choses Technique 1908 Board.

The following is an account of the business transacted in the twelve meetings of the Board: The first meeting was called to order by Mr. Heath, president of the class, on Wednesday, March 14. Mr. McGuigan was elected chairman, and Mr. Webb secretary-treasurer. Mr. Donnewald, Editor-in-chief of the 1907 *Technique*, explained the manner in which the elections have been conducted in past years and spoke of several things more or less established by precedent. A committee of three was appointed to draw up the Constitution, which was adopted at the next meeting.

On March 19 the committee for the art competition was chosen, Messrs. Williams, Vonnegut and Dolke being elected. At the fifth meeting Messrs. Witmer, M. E. Allen, Rapelye and Gimson were elected.

The seventh meeting was devoted to the discussion and election of business managers. Messrs. Brooks and Putnam were elected and at the next meeting Mr. Given was elected the third business manager.

At the tenth meeting, on April 4, Messrs. Heilman and Webb were elected statisticians, and in the last two meetings Mr. McGuigan was elected society editor, Mr. Adams the fourth business manager, and Mr. Glover athletic editor.

The officers of the Board, comprising the editor-in-chief, the business manager, the secretary, the treasurer, and the chief art editor will be chosen by the Board itself during May.

The baseball game scheduled for yesterday afternoon between the Tech 1908 and Demeritte School teams was cancelled early in the day.

SHOW PHOTOGRAPHED.

Individual and Group Pictures of Cast Taken Last Sunday at Marceau's.

The photographer has now had his share in developing and advertising the Tech Show. Early Sunday morning the entire cast assembled at the Marceau studio on Tremont Street, and at nine o'clock the dressing began. Many pictures were taken of the whole cast, of the chorus, and of various sub-groups of different members of the chorus, and then individual and group pictures were taken of the principals.

The difficulty and magnitude of the task of successfully carrying through the dressing, making-up and posing of such a large company will be comprehended when it is considered that the photographers were not through with the chorus until noon, and it was 2.15 P.M. before they had snapped the last group of the principals. Special care was taken in making up, and much merriment was caused by the dozens of feminine figures, upon whose owners *pro tempore* girlhood had been thrust for the first time. Dressers of the Cadet Theatricals cast who were present, pronounced the costumes even superior to those of the players in "Miss Pocohontaa."

He is well known by the Harvard men, and is a very forceful and successful speaker, especially among college men. He has chosen for his subject on Thursday "A Student's Responsibilities." It is expected that a good number will be present.
