ATHLETIC EXHIBITION.

Preparations Point to an Event Far Outshining the First Exhibition.

A very satisfactory program has been arranged for the Exhibition this evening which promises far to excel the performance of last year. There will be exhibitions in the following work: Flying Rings, Horizontal Bars, Parallel Bars, Tumbling, Indian Clubs, Buck, Horizontal Ladder, Second Parallel Bars, High and Pike Diving, and Long Horse; also a sparring match and a hand-ball game.

About half of last year's team are back and have shown a great improvement over former work, while the new men have been practicing hard and are doing almost as well as the veterans. Altogether the team is well practiced in general gymnastic work, besides the unusual proficiency each man has acquired in his specialty.

Lowrie, '06, on the flying rings is a star performer, being in excellent form and unusually strong. Two new men, Kales, '06, and Belden, '09, are also showing well in this event. Bentley, '06, Kales, '06, Sharp, '07, and Gibbons, '06, form a combination hard to beat on the high horizontal bar; while on the parallel bars Smith, '07, Sharp, '07, Lowrie, '06, Gibbons, '06, Belden, '09, and Capt. Griffin, '06, can match almost any college team in New England. One of the star events of the evening will be the tumbling exhibit, in which Griffin, '06, and Sharp, '07, will give a performance which will far outshine their brilliant work of last year. Smith's skill with the Indian clubs should bring forth great applause as he has been working hard on new movements. Haywood, '06, Gerhard, '06, Bartlett, '06, and Tobin, '08, will give pleasing performances on the buck, horizontal ladder, and second parallel bars. A feature will be the sparring match between Donovan, '06, and Schneider, '08, which should prove very exciting, as both are clever with the gloves. Another innovation will be a handball game between Bartlett, '06, and Rice, '08. Altogether an entertainment will be given which will well repay a large attendance.

PROF. JAGGAR TO SEE VESUVIUS.

Professor T. A. Jaggar of the geological department is on his way to Vesuvius. He will confer with a noted gathering of geologists who are hastening there with all speed. They will examine every feature of the present eruption, take photographs, and hold conferences on the causes and results.

Professor Jaggar will represent the Alexander Agassiz Museum. He was also at Mt. Pelee during its activity and will pay special attention to a comparison of the activities of the two mountains.

BIOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

Recent Work under Prof. Sedgwick — Demand Large for Sanitary Engineers.

The demand this spring for sanitary biologists and sanitary engineers is extraordinarily large. Within the last week Professor Sedgwick has received requests from state and local boards of health and consulting sanitary engineers for eight men, at salaries ranging from \$75 a month to \$2400 a year. Most of these places he has been unable to fill from lack of men.

Prof. S. C. Prescott recently gave an address at the Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, under the auspices of the Maryland State Board of Health, on "The Production of Clean Milk as a Practical Proposition." Professor Prescott has under his supervision at present some two hundred dairies in the eastern part of Massachusetts and is recognized as a leading authority on the general subject of sanitary milk supply for cities and towns.

The donor of the Sanitary Research Laboratory and Sewage Experiment Station has contributed a further sum of \$5000 for continuing the work begun in 1903. An elaborate report of the results of the investigations of the first two years has been prepared by Prof. C. F. A. Winslow, biologist-in-charge, and Mr. E. B. Phelps, research chemist and bacteriologist, and will soon be published under the auspices of the Hydrographic Bureau of the U. S. Geological Survey. A popular exposition of the results will also be prepared for the benefit of individuals and communities which have to deal with sewerage or sewage disposal problems. No other educational institution in the world, so far as known, possesses a sanitary research laboratory or sewage experiment station of this kind, and it is doubtless largely because of the opportunities and training which these furnish that sanitary biologists and sanitary engineers trained at the Institute are in so great and growing demand.

Arthur I. Kendall, Ph. D., a graduate of the Biological Department in the Class of 1900, now Acting Chief of the Board of Health Laboratory of the Isthmian Canal Commission at Ancon near Panama, spoke to Professor Sedgwick's Class in Sanitary Science and Public Health at one of its recent meetings on sanitary conditions and care of the health on the Isthmus. Dr. Kendall gave many suggestions of practical value to men intending to work under tropical conditions.

Dr. Percy S. Stiles, Instructor in the Department, is giving a special course of one hour a week, open to students in all Departments, on Personal Hygiene. It is hoped that this course, which is specially intended for engineers and others whose work may place them under unsanitary conditions, may be made

THE ARCHITECTS' COMPETITION.

Every year the Boston Society of Architects offers two prizes of \$50 each, one to the regular and one to the special student who best solves a chosen problem in the fourth-year course in Architecture. A committee of the society selects the problem and judges the drawings. This year the problem was a Monumental Fire Place in a Building for the Hague Tribunal. The plans were submitted on March 20th, and last Wednesday the report containing the decisions was posted. The prizes were awarded to Wm. Rasmussen, special, and J. T. Wrinkle, regular student; and the following men were mentioned in order of excellence, Samuel Gideon, and J. H. Cady of the specials and Charles G. Loring, A. A. Blodgett, and F. Logan for the regular students. In the report the committee said that they were very much pleased with the way in which the work had been done.

The competition was founded by the Boston Society of Architects in 1903, in order to improve the work done by men at the Institute. The subjects of former competitions were: '03, "The Doorway to a City Club"; '05, "A Bay Window"; '05, "A Gate to a Private Park."

The drawings are now on exhibition in the Exhibition Hall in Pierce.
