"Men's seizing of opportunities make their abilities."

Tomorrow night is Senior Night at the Kommers. As this is the last Class Kommers of the year, everyone should attend. The fact that the Seniors will furnish the entertainment should not make anyone feel that he would be out of place, even though not a Senior. Everyone ought to turn out and make this Kommers a great success. Let us show that the Tech Union is too small to hold us all and that we must have a Walker Memorial to accommodate the students who believe in "rubbing elbows" and getting acquainted.

Tonight at the Gymnasium will be held the Second Annual Gymnastic Meet. When this meet was held for the first time last year the interest which was shown in the exhibition seemed to warrant the establishment of a custom — that of holding a meet annually. Increased interest in gymnastic work has manifested itself since the opening of the new Gymnasium last fall, and at the second annual meet tonight the results of considerable practice and training on the part of the participants should be very satisfactory. A meet of this sort shows to the student who rarely does any gymnasium work, what can be accomplished by practice and at the same time gives some idea of the value of gymnastic work both as a training and as a diversion. Diversion is as necessary as work and boxing as well as handball, three-deep, and other games furnish a splendid opportunity to obtain it.

ELECTRICAL ENGINEERS MEET.

The third annual dinner of the Seniors in Electrical Engineering was held Tuesday evening at the Burger Brau and fully upheld the reputation for good fellowship established by the two Junior gatherings. Professors Clifford, Laws, and Puffer and Messrs. Coburn and Jackson were the guests of the evening. After the physical discussion of the menu, Professor Clifford gave a technical discussion of the menu cards, which took the form of a vector diagram, and spoke of the very pleasant relations which have existed between students and instructors of the department. Professor Puffer told some interesting stories illustrating the difficulties which had to be overcome in professional work, and Professor Laws spoke of the unsettled state of the department during the last few years, outlined the future policy, and reminded the fellows that in the years to come their advice would be valuable in the carrying out of that policy. Informal talks were given by President Wetterer, on "Our Professors," Steel, on "What we have Learned," Green, on "Jackson as I have known Him," and by Furness, Jackson, and Coburn.
