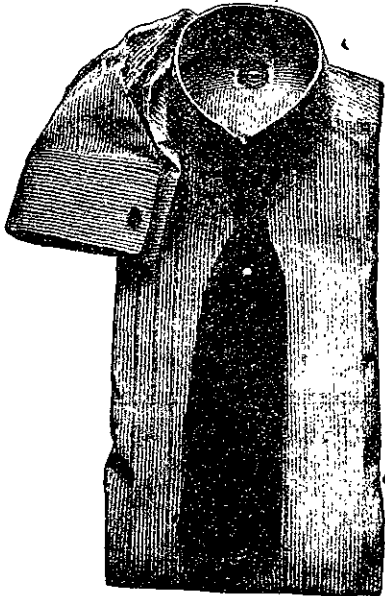

STRONG ADDRESS AT Y. M. C. A.

Rev. A. P. Fitch of the Mt. Ver-
non Street Church spoke at the Y.
